War Memories Continued from Last Month



It was great to be back at School even though we did not have a full curriculum we were at school mornings only.

Our form teacher Mr Stewart was brilliant. Every morning the first lesson was bringing us up to date with the area's our forces were fighting in. The most interesting for me was the war in the Middle East. We had updates every morning about Tobruk and the surrounding areas, fighting between Field Marshall Montgomery

and Rommel, both brilliant strategists.

Robert came home for Christmas 1940 which was lovely for me to have my brother home. On the 22nd December 1940 the blitz started, sadly Robert got appendicitis, the doctor came first and diagnosed him then an ambulance was called and he and my Mum travelled through area's where bombs were dropping and our ack ack guns were firing at the German planes. My Mum stayed at the hospital (Booth Hall Children's Hospital) until Robert had had his operation then made her way home. Robert made a full recovery but had to stay in hospital over Christmas.

Meanwhile back at home we were living through a blitz every night. My Dad reckoned no one could get out of bed as quickly as me when the sirens went off. I used to dive out of bed, drag my siren suit on (a 'onesie' in today's speak) run downstairs grab my budgies cage off its stand, get the lead on my dog and dive into our shelter in the garden, complete with gas mask.

My Dad was an Air Raid Warden, he was outside with our neighbours, my Mum would be on the back path chatting to neighbours over the fence. None of them would get into the shelter, unless the bombs came thick and fast, which sometimes they did. We lived close to Heaton Park which was an RAF station, this was a target for the German's.

In 1941 I was 11 years old, at this age selected pupils sat a scholarship to get into a High School, if you didn't pass you went to a Central School. I along with another girl called Barbara Hamer were sent to a school in Cheetham Hill to sit the scholarship, there were a few other girls as well from other schools. Boys went on different days.

Both Barbara and I passed and were allocated places, me at Manchester High and Barbara at Harpurhey High School. My dad did not want me going into Manchester on my own, he asked the Education authority if I could go to Harpurhey, fortunately they agreed. We started our senior school in September 1941. This was the first experience of full time school we had since 1939. I loved it, I stayed until 1948 and count those years as some of the happiest of my life. While there I made friends with 5 other girls, we remained friends for the rest of our lives.

Sadly I have lost them all now, and I miss them. We were scattered across the world but never lost touch.
