



Droitwich Spa Meeting Centre celebrates after receiving almost £175,000 from the National Lottery to help local people living with dementia and family members/carers

The Droitwich Spa Meeting Centre is today celebrating after being awarded almost £175,000 in National Lottery funding to support its work over the next four years with local people living with dementia and their family members/carers with disabilities.

The Meeting Centre, which is open each Wednesday, Thursday and Friday from 10.30 to 3.30 at the Droitwich Rugby Club, is essentially a social club where its members and their care partners can come to enjoy the company of others in a normal community setting where they can relax, have fun, talk to others and get the help they need by participating in a variety of activities that address their emotional, cognitive and social requirements. This helps them to adjust to their changing needs and re-build their confidence and reduce anxiety over the future.

The Meeting Centre, the first of its kind in the UK, has been running since September 2015 and is staffed by a dedicated team from Age UK Herefordshire and Worcestershire. Around 12- 15 members attend each day, with some coming for just for one day each week, while others come for two or three days.

The new funding from The National Lottery Community Fund, which distributes money raised by National Lottery players for good causes and is the largest community funder in the UK, will remove uncertainty over the future of the Centre and provide a stable environment that will contribute to the Centre's members and carers health and wellbeing.

The funding will also enable the Meeting Centre to share its experience and help develop best practice with the wider dementia community through the Centre's participation in the National Lottery funded UK Meeting Centres Support Programme (UKMCSP) by hosting visits to Centre from visitors across the UK which are interested in setting up a Meeting Centre in their local area. The experience gained will also enable the Centre to build a strong evidence base for this and other Meeting Centres to present to local and national funders

and influence policy makers/commissioners in order to build a lasting legacy from the National Lottery funding.

Derek Radcliffe, Chair of the Droitwich Spa Meeting Centre charity says: "We're delighted that The National Lottery Community Fund has recognised our work in this way. Now, thanks to National Lottery players we will be able to continue to help local people living with dementia and their family members. This is important because it helps members and their family members/carers both to build relationships with others facing similar challenges and to create their own supportive circle of friends."

Philip Talbot, Chief Executive of Age UK Herefordshire and Worcestershire says: "A diagnosis of dementia can really overwhelm people, it impacts on their self-image, their relationships with other people and their confidence. We are, therefore, pleased to be able to provide a varied programme of activities at the Meeting Centre which helps people to rebuild their confidence, to feel less overwhelmed, to feel less lonely and less isolated".

Jeff Mayes, a former RAF Flight Lieutenant and member of the Centre says: "I started to get dementia and everything went down from there, You feel as though you have got nothing left but this place has given me a purpose. You can join in with whatever's going on and have a good time. The people at the Meeting Centre are so good, They are there to look after you but they keep the spirit going all the time. It's a very happy place. I don't know how I'd manage if I didn't have this place to come to – it fills a big hole in my life"

Professor Dawn Brooker, Director of the Association for Dementia Studies at the University of Worcester says: "Meeting Centres are based on solid research about what really helps people and families cope with the challenges that dementia brings. The Association for Dementia Studies at the University of Worcester has been working on this research since 2014. There is tremendous interest across the UK in setting up new Meeting Centres. This funding will ensure that many more communities have the opportunity to visit a fully operational Meeting Centre and to receive practical advice on how to establish their own."
