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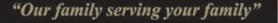
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Membership

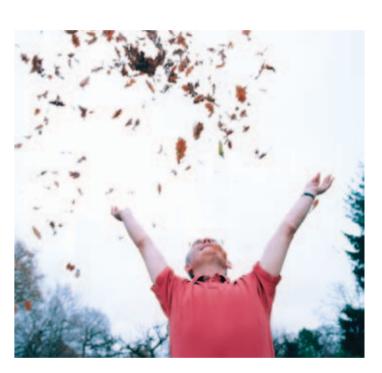

Now a new kind of grandparent is emerging. Juggling work and family commitments, the nation's 14 million grans and granddads are holding up the economy and finding an everincreasingly powerful voice in society.

As the cost of living rises, many families in Britain are living on one and a half incomes, with both parents working hard to give their children a better start in life. With limited time and the increasing price of childcare, there is a desperate need for 'Super Gran', or even a 'Gallant Granddad!' Free childcare from grandparents can make all the difference to a family struggling to make ends meet. Grandparents are responsible for a whopping £3.9 billion worth of childcare a year in this country.

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Love covers all. Even when separated by war and distance, the love between Sid & Kathleen Morley survived the test of time, as evidenced in their letters to each other, written between 1940 and 1945. Be moved and inspired as you follow the journey of their romance.

Sidney Morley, a soldier born in Mansfield, Nottinghamshire, met Kathleen Joan Tilley, a Post Office assistant, in Croydon, at the Palais de Dance. Their blossoming romance continued as Sid went back to fight as a regular soldier in Norway. Whilst desperately love-sick, Sid wrote, 'My stomach feels terribly empty, I love you Kath. My humble plead may be useless, for perhaps you have another fellow? I guess, if I'm right I cannot do anything about that. ... If you allow me to see you, what do you say? You should know that I'm sincere. All my love Sid.'

In the early days it seemed that the rather more love-struck Sid had to keep on his toes to woo the more cautious Kathleen. He wrote, 'I have a slight impression that you do think a little about me. But your letters are very tantalizing and I gather very little from them.' Sid's fears were soon to be allayed, as Kath was very soon convinced that they were meant to be together, and they were married at St Peter and Paul Roman Catholic Church on 22nd February 1942.

But love was not to keep these two on the same shores, even after their wedding. Sid had originally joined up in June 1939 as a regular soldier, to avoid working down the pit in Mansfield, but as fortunes turned, and as Germany invaded Poland, everything changed. The Second World War had begun, and over the next six years, Kathleen was to be left behind on home ground, while Sid trooped around the world, from Norway, to North Africa, to Italy. Putting on a brave face, Kath wrote, 'Sweetheart Mine, How I count the days til next week when I hope to be seeing you. I'm awaiting a letter from you again but that is nothing new, for as soon as I've had one I start looking for the next one. tell me, have you grown another moustache, how will I know you when I see you (not considering the fact that your photo with your ma is stuck up in front of me all day, and the photo with me I kiss goodnight and take to bed with me.)

Sid responded, 'News from you Darling gave me a new lift. You wouldn't know how much. I'm waiting for the next one now. You won't let me out of your sight eh, you wait til I come home for good it will be the opposite. I won't let you out of my sight, or even out of my arms…'

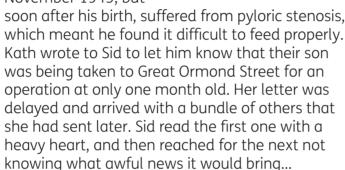
Even Christmas was not to reunite the couple. 'Darling wife – Christmas in Italy. I did think along with the rest that we would be spending our Xmas in England. Back in North Africa – everything pointed that way. However, it's a fact now – we're on the soil of Italy. Where the Romans fear to tread.'

'I'm anxiously waiting for news from you – hoping you are happy and healthy dear. Are you happy?'

It wasn't long before the arrival of a Mini-Morley was on the cards. Kath wrote, impatiently to Sid, 'Sid for heaven's sake write to your Mum and break the news gently about Anthony otherwise I'd feel too awkward, as if I were there under false pretence.' The name of this new arrival was either to be Anthony, if he was a boy, or Diana, if a girl. Sid dreamt excitedly of fatherhood.... 'Gosh, I'm thinking of our Anthony or Diana Kathleen ... not be long now darling. I'm excited, I almost feel that I'm at your side hugging you... You're going to bring

him/her into the world very soon. I guess I'm going to be the happiest father as well as husband in the world.'

But things were not to go as smoothly as Sid had hoped.... Anthony Wilson Morley made an appearance on 16th November 1943, but



'Darling- things have been happening, from your letter 'these past few days' I have had bad news and very good news. Your first letter of three that I received at the same time gave me a shock. I felt wretched and could hardly find courage to open the other letter that was in rotation. My whole nervous system was deadened or numbed. The next letter revived me. This news set the seed of love for my son growing more than ever – I reckon I love him nearly as much as you. What would we have done I don't know if we had lost our Babs?'



The months went on, and Sid wrote regularly to Kath of his travels, never letting her too far out of his heart...'I was on top of a mountain today it almost joined the heavens! What a climb, was rewarded with its wonderful view could see that famous volcano belshing out smoke and sparks. Italy improves as one travels. I would like to see Rome. Perhaps I will. I

reckon Berlin will not be worth seeing. Paris is not in a bad state according to my reckoning – that would be ok – because it's nearer Calais & Calais is only a few miles to 46 Edmund Rd, where my wife & sweetheart & son is waiting.'

Kath often wrote of her loneliness, apart from Sid, and he replied,

'You mentioned that you have a feeling of loneliness at times, as you say mostly when you see others at home, their husbands, or you notice how happy they are together. Don't feel that way darling, it will not be long now. Then we will say goodbye to that disease. Sure loneliness is a disease, I have had it many times, but I shook it off because it's best to – if you don't it becomes dangerous. The signs when you have got it bad stick out a mile. You either become irritable in everything you see or do so you become careless, and begin to lash out.'

In February 1944 disaster struck. Sid was captured at Anzio and held as a prisoner of war. Kath wrote, 'I'm so worked up thinking that the war might end any time and I'm in a whirl, all I can think of is that I might see you soon. It's hammering in my head, and at night I dream all sorts of silly dreams, about you. It gets me by the throat and I can't think right, wonder how you'll come, if I'll meet you at the station or if you'll come straight to me and Anton, what you will say to us, and what will I, what can I say to you, I'll not be able to speak, forgive me Sid if I cry at you out of sheer joy, I love you so much Sid, this time of parting has never altered that, my face and figure have changed but not my heart. It's all yours dearest, Anton loves you too darling, he kisses your photo, soon it will be you he will kiss. All our love Sid, ever yours...'

It was in May 1945 that Sid was finally able to write with news of his safety.

'Darling, at last I'm able to write, you must be wondering what has happened to me? For a start, I'm quite healthy. Our camp was liberated on May 23rd by Russian Troops. Now I'm at a place called Halle. You have most likely heard lots about it on the war news. From here we voyage par avion. You know that thousands have been flown home? I guess you know that your husband is one of the last to leave Germany.'

After being reunited at the end of the war, Sid & Kathleen went on to have 6 children, and lived in Church Warsop where Sid worked at the pit. They moved to Calverton, Notts in 1952. Over the years they had 15 grandchildren and lived

to celebrate 61 years of marriage.

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Good to have on your side

As the cost of living continues to rise, and as energy providers threaten to increase their prices by 10% this summer, many people are struggling to make ends meet. Age UK Notts chatted to members of the Derby 50+centre. about their concerns.

The Friendship Group at Derby's Age UK 50+ Centre were sipping tea and munching digestives on a Thursday morning.

They needed little encouragement to talk about the rise in food and fuel prices. Over the last few years, the cost of living has risen dramatically across Britain. In the year up to April, food prices went up by 5%. Opinions were lively...

'Isn't it diabolical?', exclaimed Jean, age 69, 'you do notice your bill is bigger when you get to the

checkout. To be honest, there are times when I think, 'Have they made a mistake? Should I query this?'

The rest of the group murmured in agreement. Most of them have lived in Derby for many years, and have really been feeling the pinch of late. Ronald and Freda explained how they're thinking of changing supermarkets after their latest Sainsbury's shop cost them £60 when it used to cost £40. The price of bread, meat and

vegetables have been the highest risers, according to Jean and Freda, although a few of the group seem to find they spend the most money on cat food!

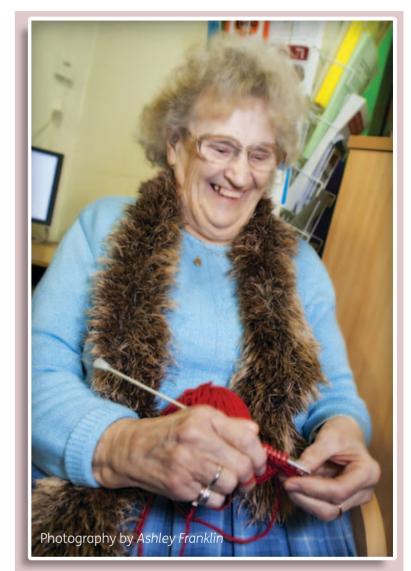
They are not the only ones to struggle with the cost of living. The Investment Company, the Alliance Trust, calculated that those in the 50-64 age bracket are set to suffer the highest rise of inflation, due to the focus on food and fuel in their budget. Pensioners relying on state benefits have also been hit particularly hard, and Pensioner's savings are likely to be below the inflation rate.

And it's not only food..... as soon as the 'P word' was mentioned a groan rippled across the room at the 50+ centre. Petrol prices have been rising and many older people are altering their habits as a result. They might go on day trips less often, or decide to shop more locally. Sue, 63, had been shocked by the price of her daughter's daily journeys to work. 'It's 50 odd pounds worth of petrol in her car, and that's every week; just to fill the tank up.'

As the conversation drifted on to the increase in energy prices, there were more sighs and exclamations. The ongoing crisis in the Middle East and the reverberations from the Japanese tsunami have caused world oil prices to rise, which could affect energy prices here in the UK. In June,

Scottish Power announced that they were putting up their prices by 10% this summer.
Other provides wi no doubt do the same.





Our group in Derby admitted how it had affected them:

'Sometimes we turn the heating off early,' explained Freda, 'and sit in our dressing gowns downstairs before bed'. Husband Ronald added 'and we don't leave the television on for very long any more.'

Purse strings may be tightly tied, but the mood at the Friendship Group was not entirely quashed by the sombre economic climate. These over 60s seemed committed to saving where they could, whether that be buying washing powder in bulk or switching their supermarket. They won't let anything stop them living life to the full!

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Free Will Writing

Many older people do not have a will in place, which means that when they die the law will decide how their estate is distributed. For couples, especially, this could mean that the surviving partner is not left in the position their loved one would have wanted.

By contacting Age UK Notts and requesting help with writing a basic will, you will be entitled to a free consultation with a local solicitor, who will draft a will in accordance with your instructions. All we ask in return is a donation to Age UK Notts.

TAI CHI & QIGONG

Ready for the Digital TV Switchover?

The digital TV switchover is happening across Nottinghamshire between March and September 2011. The old analogue signal will be switched off and thousands of homes will be able to receive digital TV (Freeview) through an aerial for the first time. If you currently receive just five TV channels through an aerial on any of your TVs, you'll need to convert these to digital. If you already get Freeview, you will need to re-tune your digital TV or digital box at both stages of switchover. Satellite and cable TV services are not affected.

There are a number of ways to get digital television. The postcode checker on the Digital UK website at www.digitaluk.co.uk can tell you when you switch and the services available in your area or you can call the Digital UK advice line on 08456 50 50 50. Remember, you don't need to buy a new TV for switchover as almost any TV can be converted using a digital box, available from around £20. Ingredients

- 250g (9 oz) ginger nut biscuits
- 100g (3 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz) butter, melted

Filling:

- 405a can Condensed Milk
- finely grated zest and juice of 5 large
- 300ml carton double cream

To decorate (optional):

- 30g (10 oz) chocolate, melted
- 6-8 thin lime wedges and slivers of zest

You will also need:

• 20cm (8") loose-bottomed cake tin. greased and lined with grease-proof paper

Method

- . To make the base, crush the biscuits by placing them in a plastic bag and hit them with a rolling pin until they are like fine crumbs or blitz in a food processer and then combine with the melted butter. Press the mixture into the base and 4cm (1½") up the sides of the tin. Chill the base while you make the filling.
- Whisk together the filling ingredients until thick and creamy. Spoon over the biscuit base and chill for at least 1 hour.
- Remove the pie from the tin and place on a serving plate. Drizzle the melted chocolate over the top and leave to set. Before serving, decorate with the lime wedges and the zest.

our family home has been a delightful haven over the years; many feet have run in and out of it, both children and grandchildren, and many happy memories have been made. But now it's becoming a burden, and the constant need to maintain your property is dragging you down. It might be that you simply need a helping hand to manage alterations to your house, or perhaps you are starting to believe that a move might be inescapable.

Perhaps you are facing a long-term illness which would be impossible to face in your current abode. You'd never face the stairs, or you'd need more support. You worry how you would ever pay for a more suitable house, and you're scared that the burden will fall on your children.

You are not alone. As the years go by, many older people at some point face the inevitable question. Do I stay or do I go?

Help is at hand. The Bentleys own a three bedroom house, where they have lived happily for many years. Both Mr & Mrs Bentley have serious health issues. Mr Bentley has cancer and Mrs Bentley recently had to have a hip replacement. To top this off, she also has kidney problems. The couple needed the use of a stair lift to access the upstairs of their home. However there was a lengthy wait before it could be fitted, time Mr Bentley simply didn't have. The Bentleys decided to give Derbyshire Housing Options a call. Initially, their case worker, Margaret, thought the only option was for them to move to a bungalow but they were very distressed at the thought of leaving their existing home. So, instead, Margaret was able to assist them to receive various payments that they didn't even know were available to them. As a couple they are now £717 per month better off and have been able to get a stair lift fitted using their own resources. (The names of the owners have been changed in this article)

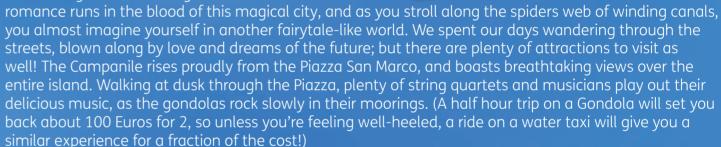

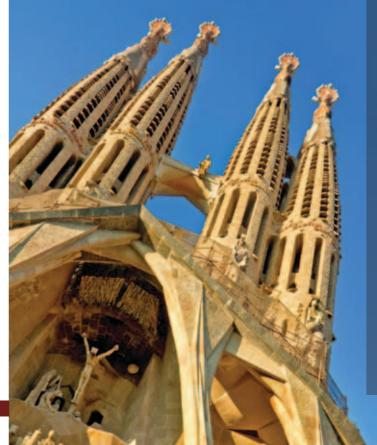
Short Breaks in Europe

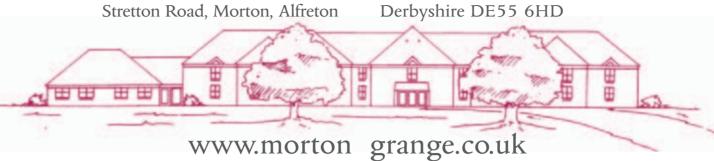

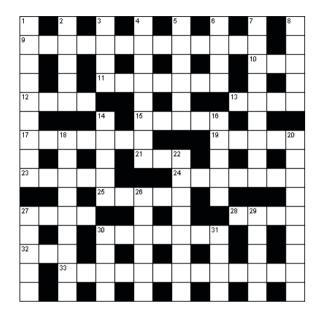

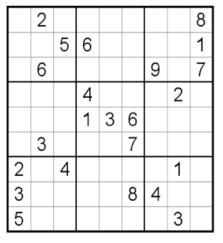
