Garden



The bright and inviting colours of newly blooming flowers are one of the most iconic images of spring, but any gardener can tell you that the best gardens take time and care to cultivate. Here are our three top tips for creating a beautiful spring garden

Prepare well in early spring

In early spring you want to take the proper time to prepare your garden. Clear away any leaves or mulch that has accumulated over the winter months. Also, take time to get rid of any weeds that have grown in your flower beds before they begin to flourish at the expense of the new plants you are hoping to grow. Whilst you are doing this, make sure to look out for any unwanted garden pests that may be hibernating and get rid of them before they thrive. Pruning is also an important task at this time of year. Cut back trees, shrubs, and flowers to encourage new growth.

Plan and plant in good time

You may be the type of person who plans their garden well in advance or be more lastminute, but for optimum growth it is important to plant in the correct timeframe to enable your plants to flourish. If you want to start plants

from seeds this will require extra time, so plan a trip to the garden centre or other retailer at the earliest opportunity to pick out vour seeds. Consult the back of the packets to establish the appropriate time to plant them in order to hit optimum growing season. If you are unsure what to plant this year consider injecting colour into your garden by introducing dahlias or cannas; if it is vegetables you are after, potatoes and onions are brilliant kitchen staples that can be planted in the spring months.

Protect your newly growing plants

Like any living thing, plants need care and attention; keep your plants appropriately hydrated and be sure to use compost or manure to ensure the young plants get enough nutrients. In mid spring it is important to keep an eve out for overcrowding, particularly with perennials. If you think that roots are growing too close together and so may be depriving some plants of necessary nutrients and water, take the first opportunity to relocate one or more of these plants elsewhere. We hope that these top tips can help you create an attractive and fruitful garden for you to enjoy throughout the spring and summer months.

4oz margarine 8oz golden syrup 3oz soft brown sugar 1 tbsp marmalade 1/4 pint milk

8oz self raising flour a pinch of salt

1 tsp mixed spice

- 4 tsp ground ginger 1/2 tsp bicarbonate of soda
- 2 eggs well beaten



DIRECTIONS

- 1 Heat margarine, syrup, sugar, marmalade and milk in saucepan over a low heat - stir to dissolve.
- 2 Leave to cool.
- **3** Sift flour with salt, spices and bicarbonate of soda into a mixing bowl.
- **4** Add the melted mixture to well beaten eggs
- 5 Pour melted mixture into dry inaredients in the mixing bowl and stir with a wooden spoon until a smooth batter is formed.
- 6 Pour into a 7" square tin lined with greaseproof paper
- 7 Bake for 1 ¼ hours at 300°F/150°C /Gas 2 on a low rack.
- 8 Cool in tin for half an hour.
- 9 Best kept wrapped in greaseproof paper in a tin for a few days to become moist.

The Age UK Business Directory has been operating since 2008 and is accessible both online and via our Freephone number. The service aims to protect older people from rogue traders by connecting them with local trustworthy traders.

Finding a trader

Knowing where to start when trying to find a local business or trader that is reliable and trustworthy, can be a bit of a daunting task. Concerns about finding a reputable trader or business are often heightened by the stories of roque traders in todav's media. Many of us have heard about cowboy builders or dodgy companies, which can make it hard to trust businesses and traders, even if they are honest. This has become a growing concern for older people in particular as unfortunately these unscrupulous people seem to target the elderly and more vulnerable in our communities.

"I was really grateful to be put in touch with a good

reliable company. I was feeling desperate when my electric went and I did not know who to trust".

Vetting & checking

To address these concerns Age UK Nottingham and Nottinghamshire, in partnership with Age UK Derby and Derbyshire, set up the Business Directory which aims to connect you with local traders and businesses that they have checked. All member companies have been checked by local Age UK staff. This checking process consists of

· A face to face meeting with the potential member · A check of any professional

or memberships

or trade qualifications · A check that the trader or



business has appropriate and adequate insurance • Writing to previous customers and suppliers to check they have a history of reliable trading • Signing our Age UK Business Directory customer charter which sets out a code of conduct which each trader must abide by · A declaration authorising Trading Standards to talk with Age UK about the company should the need arise

How do vou know if a business is a member of the Age UK Business Directory?

All of our members are all given a membership logo. This can be used as vehicle signage, on their website, paperwork and adverts. They will also be provided with a membership certificate.



You can also check a business's membership by visiting our websites www. aubdnotts.org.uk or www.aubdderbys.co.uk or by calling us on 0800 011 4653.

We will be happy to confirm membership and provide details of other local traders.

We search for suitable traders and businesses for you by entering your full postcode and the trade category on our website. The traders are then listed by distance from your postcode with the nearest first. We always give a minimum of three trader's details to you, as we always suggest obtaining guotes from more than one. This allows you to decide who is the best trader for the job.

Customer Feedback

All our members are monitored through customer feedback. Reviews and star ratings can be given either by completing a review card left with you by the trader along with a prepaid envelope, by telephone or you can add a review onto the trader's entry on our website. "They were punctual explained everything clearly and carried out the job quickly and clearly".

ge UK Derby and Derbyshire operate a very popular and successful lunch club in the Chaddesden Centre, Derby. In fact it has been going since 1967, long before Age UK Derby & Derbyshire started running the centre. The lunch club was initially started by Madge Palfryman and members of Chaddesden Bowls group, who used the centre in the winter months for short mat bowls. Madge died a year ago but the kitchen has now been named after her with a plaque on the door. This is a very fitting tribute as everyone remembers her kindness and the work she put into cooking the meals.

The lunch club now operates every Thursday morning. catering for 25 people, but has a long waiting list. Half of the members use community transport to attend the centre and the others make their own way there on foot or by taxi. The cook is a retired local school cook, Maureen Ford, who heads up a team of seven volunteers, three men and four women. Each have their own role to play, whether that is peeling veg, setting tables,

preparing the pudding, teas and coffees, washing up etc. It all runs like clockwork. There is always a varied menu comprised of good, wholesome foods, which are purchased fresh on the day.

The lunch club will often have seasonal or themed special events. One such event was the Christmas meal, where all the food was kindly provided by the local Aldi store. There was entertainment from a local trio and some songs from members of the lunch club.

Most of the lunch club members use one or more of the other services on offer during the week in the centre. It really does help to reduce loneliness and isolation in the community. Friendship groups have formed and people organise activities outside the centre for themselves, supported by the centre staff where needed. For example four members organised a Christmas Day meal at a pub together, whereas they would have been on their own.

Nutrition and **Hydration Week:** 14th – 20th March 2016 like diabetes, urinary

During Nutrition and Hydration tract infections and chest week, a lot of Age UK Derby & Derbyshire services will once again be joining thousands nationally who will be promoting awareness of healthy and proper eating among older people. One of the most important things for older people is to eat well and drink sufficient liquid. Although that may seem obvious very many older people live in poor health, become seriously ill and even die because they do not eat and drink regularly. There are lots of reasons: Poor eyesight, mobility and strength can make shopping and cooking

in appetite, taste and smell can make mealtimes unappealing: memory problems mean people forget to eat: emotional issues like loneliness and bereavement can leave older people feeling depressed and unmotivated to eat; and sometimes people reduce how much they eat and drink to try to manage problems with incontinence.

Whatever the reason, not eating and drinking appropriately can make health conditions worse or even cause conditions infections. Not eating well can make you feel depressed, feel cold and dizzy and make you more likely to fall or catch infections or become hypothermic in cold weather.

Dealing with property & assets abroad in your Will



Mandy Kelly, Director and Head of the Wills, Trusts and Probate team at Actons Solicitors in Nottingham and a member of the Society of Trust and Estate Practitioners, provides some practical advice for people who own property abroad. It highlights the importance of ensuring Wills are reviewed in the light of recent changes to EU law.

Wills and

Testamentary Freedom A Will is a document that sets out what you want to happen with your property, savings and other assets when you die. UK Nationals have total freedom to direct their UK property and investments how and to who they wish, passing it to a spouse or civil partner, shared amongst children, to a cohabitee, to friends or to Charities. This is known as Testamentary Freedom.

Forced Heirship

Such freedom is not generally enjoyed in Europe who impose forced heirship rules. Where UK nationals own property in EU states, forced heirship rules mean they have to take real care if they are to ensure that their foreign based holiday homes pass to the people they intend it to.

Forced heirship rules can be very confusing and unfair, and can cause real upset to UK Nationals who are more used to testamentary freedom. Different forced heirship rules apply in different countries but the usual result is a lack of control for the surviving spouse or civil partners; lack of recognition for unmarried cohabitees and children of both present and former marriages taking set shares in the holiday home whatever the wishes of the deceased.

The new law

A new EU regulation has been in force since 17 August 2015. It allows nationals of any State both EU States and non-EU States such as the UK, Spain, France and Italy, to elect that the law of their country of 'habitual residence' is to apply to their foreign based property. This means the country where they are classed as living when they die.

By making the right election in their Wills, UK Nationals can elect for UK law to apply to their EU based holiday homes so they can now pass on their death without the application of forced heirship. This enables them to leave property abroad to whoever they wish.

Why is this important

All too often individuals fail to direct what they want to happen to their homes abroad, wrongly assuming that their UK Will is enough to deal with it even when the UK Will makes no reference to it or that they want UK laws to apply to the EU property.

The result is that generally the law that applies to that

EU based property is the law of the country where it is situated which often imposes forced heirship. To prevent this, everybody who owns an EU based needs to review previous their UK Wills to make sure that they contain the right statements and elections addressing this issue.

Do I need an overseas Will as well?

What suits one person may not suit another. Everybody's situation needs careful consideration. Each set of circumstances can differ and the practical options need tailoring to each individual. Some may only need one UK Will to cover all of their property wherever it is situated.

In some cases there could be other, more practical reasons to make an overseas Will as well as a UK Will ensuring that the overseas Will includes an appropriate election for UK law to apply to the overseas Will and also ensuring that if more than one Will exists they do not accidentally contradict each other.

An example is that the new regulations do not apply to lifetime gifts. Neither do they make much reference to trusts. As many properties or assets are held in trust this can make things difficult particularly in countries such as France which does not fully recognise trusts in the same way that the UK law does.

Accidentally cancelling an Overseas Will

Historically many people have had two Wills: an English Will to deal with their possessions in England and a separate overseas Will to deal with their foreign assets and property.

Most Wills includes a clause that cancels all previous Wills they may have made. It is therefore very important to think about this and to specifically check each Will to make sure that no Will accidentally cancels a Will elsewhere that it was not meant to cancel. It is also very important to make sure that where more than one Will is in existence they do not contradict each other.

The important thing is to have a clear plan regarding what you want to happen to all of your assets wherever they may be and to ensure that you make your advisors aware of all of your assets and property and of any previous Wills you may have.

You and your advisors need to view everything together to include details of your assets and your family circumstances as only then can you ensure that your Will or Wills are valid.

A new visiting service in North Nottinghamshire

Could you be a friend to an older forces veteran? Or are you an older veteran, or know one, in need of companionship and support in North Nottinghamshire?

f so, you're in luck. Age UK Nottingham & Nottinghamshire in partnership with the Royal British Legion have just launched a new visiting service called "Forces Friends".

The service will work with veterans aged 60 plus and their dependents, aiming to tackle the loneliness and isolation that older veterans can experience. In addition, the project aims to recruit volunteers with a forces background to capitalise on the shared experience of volunteers and veterans alike, enabling both groups to create strong community

links and ongoing informal support networks. Volunteers will also provide support for the dependents of veterans over the age of 60. The service will be available to eligible veterans and their dependents in North Nottinghamshire throughout the districts of Mansfield, Ashfield, Newark & Sherwood and Bassetlaw.

John Anderton from AUNN, the man in overall charge of the service said:

"The Legion Grant will enable us to address the issue of loneliness amongst our older veterans' community. Funding that allows us to work directly with veterans and their dependents will provide a valuable opportunity for people to make positive changes in 2016 and for years to come.

The service will operate in North Nottinghamshire and help bring communities together."

The £37,000 funding was provided by the Royal British Legion's External Grants Programme. Daniel Esler, Head of Grants & Social Policy for the Royal British Legion said:

"The Roval British Legion's 'A UK Household Survey' of the Ex- Service Community in 2014 identified that around 370.000 veterans feel lonely and isolated. To address this Legion has committed to providing a grant of over £37,000 to Age UK Nottingham and Nottinghamshire to launch a new service that will help tackle the issues faced by our older veterans."

A Falls Prevention Instructor's story

recommended to join a gym as part of her new healthimprovement routine. Whilst initially embarrassed, Sally overcame her fears and was able to enjoy doing the exercises. After a while Sally was asked to support other people who were coming to the gym for the first time, to give them help, support and guidance. For the first time in a long while Sally felt needed and wanted. One day she was asked by one of the Health Trainers who recognised her strength in supporting chair based exercise course. was a petrifying challenge for Sally and passing the course came as a surprise to her, but gave her a big boost in her self-confidence. After her first class Sally says and Sally explains "I don't know how I did it but I did and to my surprise all

the clients came back the following week. I did feel very awkward at first, sat at the front of the class, knowing that all of the ladies followed all of the movement that I did (even the odd things that I did with my hands) but slowly, slowly I gained a lot of confidence and started to enjoy all of the classes."

Sally now runs and supports several classes a week, which are all well attended by more than 60 people and she is keen to do even more. Sally is well-loved by those who attend her groups and has made a massive difference to her client's lives. The classes keep Sally going as she doesn't want to let the people down. Sally's inspiration for continuing with the courses is getting to meet people, and the sense of achievement at seeing people improve and progress. There has been a lot of personal gain in becoming an instructor "I am much happier with my own life. I have made a lot of



new friends. I have gained a lot of confidence for myself and dealing with the general public. I think it is wonderful how people now appreciate what I do for them. I do not know where I would be if I did not have the help, advice and support of all the people who have passed though my life over the past few years."

All Falls Prevention classes in Derbyshire come under the banner of 'Strictly no Falling', which is funded by Public Health, Derbyshire County Council and delivered by Age UK Derby & Derbyshire in partnership with Derbyshire Community Health Services NHS Foundation Trust. Celebrating spring in the Northern Hemisphere

fter the long, cold months of winter, the warmth and vibrancy of spring is often a cause to celebrate, and all around the world there are many spring festivals and traditions that do just that. In this edition of EngAGE, we thought it would be interesting to take a closer look at a few of these celebrations...

Walpurgis Night

Celebrated in central and Northern Europe, Walpurgis Night marks the transition from winter to spring. Named after the English missionary St Walpurga, Wulpurgis Night is celebrated on the eve of St Walpurga's Day, which is 1st May.

Despite the shared origin, precisely how Walpurgis Night is celebrated varies between the different countries that observe it:

In Germany many traditions centre on the warding off of evil spirits by hanging blessed foliage, making loud noises and lighting bonfires. Bonfires are also central to the Swedish celebration. In Sweden, people gather around large bonfires, watch fireworks, and sing songs to welcome in the spring.

In Finland the modern celebration perhaps varies the most. Called Vappu, it is a public holiday. Historically, Vappu was celebrated by the upper classes, but more recently the festival has become connected to the student population in Finland. When you graduate from High School in Finland you receive a white cap. These caps are worn for the modern Vappu festivities, when people gather in the street in large groups to celebrate. Featuring balloons, confetti and sparkling wine or mead, it is a large carnivalstyle affair. The celebration starts on 30th April when "Havis Amanda", a statue near Helsinki's market square, is capped, and it continues until 1st May when families often spend time together picnicking in the park.

Nowruz

Nowruz is a holiday celebrated by several countries in the Middle East and Asia including Afghanistan, Albania, Iran and Turkey. Celebrated to coincide with the spring equinox (usually 21st March), Nowruz historically marked the beginning of a new year in the Persian calendar. During Nowruz, which means "new day", many take part in activities we would commonly associate with making a fresh start, such as cleaning their house and buying new clothes. In Iran, where it is often considered the biggest celebration of the year, a major part of the festivities is the setting of the 'Haft Seen'. This is a table on which seven items are laid out; every item on the table begins with the letter 'S' and has symbolic resonance relating to the New Year.

Nowruz is often celebrated with families and communities, and many people use this holiday to spend time with their families and visit their neighbours. It is these many traditions that contributed to the UN describing Nowruz as "promot[ing] values of peace and solidarity between

Canadian Tulip Festival

If you were to walk around Canada's capital city, Ottawa, during May, it wouldn't take you long to find a tulip. Since 1953 the Canadian Tulip Festival has been held every May in the capital city. The festival celebrates not only the arrival of spring in Canada, but it is also a lasting reminder of the important role that Canada played in harbouring the Dutch Royal Family during World War Two.

Following the Nazi's invasion of the Netherlands, the Dutch Royal Family was forced to leave and find refuge elsewhere. Princess Juliana sought safe harbour in Canada along with her daughters. It was during this time that Princess Juliana gave birth to Princess Margariet in Ottawa Civic Hospital. In order to guarantee Princess Margariet's status in the line of succession to the throne, Ottawa Civic Hospital was temporarily declared extraterrestrial by the government; this ensured

generations and within families as well as reconciliation and neighbourliness, thus contributing to cultural diversity and friendship among peoples

and different communities".

In 2010, the holiday was recognized by the UN's General Assembly as being part of the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity, and as such March 21st was named the International Day of Nowruz. This has been just a small snapshot of the many celebrations that happen all around the world during the spring months.

After five years of exile, Princess Juliana and her family were able to return home to the Netherlands. As a thank you to Canada for harbouring her during this time, and their role in the Netherland's liberation, Princess Juliana sent them several gifts including 100,000 tulip bulbs. The following year she sent a further 20,500 bulbs to be planted in the grounds of the Ottawa Civic Hospital. Princess Juliana continued to send Canada thousands of tulip bulbs every year until her abdication in 1980.

Today, if you were to walk around the city during the festival you would be able to see over a million tulips in bloom. As well as viewing the flowers, the festival thrives with a wealth of activities and fun for all the family, including music, art and theatre, and is attended by over 500,000 people each year.

Baba Marta

In nearby Bulgaria, Bulgarian people welcome spring on the 1st of March in their annual Baba Mata Holiday (Grandma Marta in English). Baba Marta is often described in folklore as a temperamental woman whose mood dictates the weather; this temperamental nature explains the changeability of the weather in March.

On Baba Marta, Bulgarians exchange Martenitsi. These are bracelets or two small dolls usually made of red and white wool. The two dolls are called Pizho and Penda: Pizho is the male doll and is white, while Penda is a woman made of red yarn. Whilst interpretations of exactly what each colour means vary slightly, generally red and white are seen as being symbolic of the strength, purity and fertility that spring brings. Bulgarian people are said to need to keep wearing these Martenitsi on their hands or clothes until they first see a stork or blossoming fruit tree.

Carers

Help and assistance for carers

Carers are often family members who feel that it is their duty to look after their relative, even if this is at the expense of their own health and wellbeing. Here is some of the help available to carers:

Financial help

You may be entitled to Carer's Allowance or Carer's Credit depending on your circumstances. Ask an Age UK advisor to check that you are receiving all the benefits that you are entitled to.

Health Support

Register with your GP as a carer so they can provide advice to keep you healthy, ensure that your health needs are being met, possibly offer flexible appointment times and give you access to the seasonal flu vaccinations.

Adult Care/Social Services support

Also register with your local Council Adult Care team as they will be able to provide valuable information about the support that is available for carers through the council.

Support groups

Join a local carers support group who will be able to give you detailed advice on what help is available for you as a carer.

Emergencies

If you have an accident or are unable to care for other reasons, then you can face unnecessary stress if you have nothing in place to cover this. Registering a Carers Emergency card and carrying it with you all the time enables health professionals to recognise your role in the case of an accident and ensures that the person you care for is looked after too. Creating an emergency plan will also help to take away anxiety about what happens if you can't provide the care needed.

Breaks

It may be necessary to use respite care to ensure that you get the breaks needed, whilst knowing that the person you care for is being looked after at the same time. Many organisations, such as Crossroads Care East Midlands and Revitalise offer short breaks or holidays for carers and disabled people.

The more support you get as a carer, the more effective you will be in looking after the person who you care for. If you don't get the support, then you will find that your own health needs prevents you from caring.

A Manager's story

A huge and massive thank you from all at Age UK **Derby and Derbyshire to** everyone who got behind the 'No One Should Have No One' campaign highlighting and raising awareness of loneliness and social isolation amongst older people.

he message from Age UK and the John Lewis advert, that more than 1 million people will go a month without speaking to anyone, really hit home this Christmas and Age UK Derby and Derbyshire were inundated with messages and phone calls asking how you could all help us to try and combat this.

We had the Derbyshire Fire and Rescue Service, District Nurses, School children and members of the general public arranging collections of presents and distributing them to older people living on their own. We had messages from people saying that they would be looking out for neighbours and taking them a Christmas dinner. We've had organisations distributing

hampers and people arranging Christmas parties. We've had people offering us donations of clothes for our retail charity shops. A number of you have since come back to us with your stories of those visits and experiences you had over Christmas. It seems people have been humbled by the stories from the older people they've visited and been really pleased that they gave up the time to do what they did and get to know their neighbours.

The stories and kind acts we have heard over December have been overwhelming at times but even more importantly for the older people of Derby and Derbyshire is that they haven't stopped just because Christmas has. On the first day back of the New Year a woman stopped me in the Eagle Market Derby and told me that she'd taken a Christmas lunch around to someone who she knew lived alone but didn't actually know her to speak to. She'd found that the woman had been living on her own for over ten years with no family and

hardly went out these days. She was really touched by the older woman's story and the interesting life she had before her partner died. Since Christmas day she has visited her a few times and they are becoming really good friends. The woman told me that "whilst she had breath in her, the lady she visited would never have to be on her own again". We also had someone contact us asking how they could provide a large Christmas party for older people next Christmas. Our shops have noticed an increase in people wanting to donate their unwanted Christmas gifts and unwanted clothes, and so thank you for keeping this going.

The whole campaign has highlighted that whilst No One Should Have No One at Christmas we all need to remember that no one should be without anyone all year around. To provide services to reach out to the most vulnerable, combating isolation and loneliness requires the communities within Derby and Derbyshire's support, enthusiasm and backing. Your support and backing this year of Age UK's campaign

has already meant that a lot of people will have had a happier Christmas than they might have had because of YOUR time, effort and donations.

This year, we would like to continue to build on what we've all done together in our campaign to combat loneliness and social isolation through 2016.
