#### Structure, governance and management

The charity is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) registered on 17 February 2014 as Age Cymru Ceredigion and is governed by a CIO Association constitution. The constitution was amended in January 2020, and in April 2020 it changed its name to Age Cymru Dyfed, from which date the amended constitution became effective. The charity's activities are now undertaken throughout the counties of Carmarthenshire, Ceredigion and Pembrokeshire. At 1 April 2020, the activities, assets and liabilities of Age Cymru Sir Gar (former charity no.1106321) were transferred to Age Cymru Dyfed.

#### Method of recruitment and appointment of trustees

The trustees of the charity are appointed for three year terms by the trustee board,

#### Objectives and activities

#### The charity's objects

The objects of the CIO are:

To promote the health and well-being, primarily of older people, in any manner which now is or hereafter shall be deemed by law to be charitable in and around west Wales (the counties of Carmarthenshire, Ceredigion and Pembrokeshire).

#### The charity's main activities

The charity provides projects and services for older people, their families and carers.

#### Public benefit statement

In setting its objectives and planning its activities, the board of trustees have given serious consideration to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit and in particular ensure that the activities undertaken are in line with the prevailing charitable objects and aims under which the charity was established.

#### Achievements and performance

Over the past year, the organisation has continued to experience significant growth. ACD have undertaken extensive efforts to successfully secure long-term contracts.

Our commitment to quality has been reaffirmed with the reapplication for existing quality standards and the receipt of new accreditations, including:

QISS - Quality in Information and Signposting

QPM - Advocacy Quality Mark

Armed Forces Covenant Fund - Employer Recognition Scheme (Silver)

Investors In Volunteers - Silver Award

Additionally, recruitment has been a major focus, leading to the addition of ten new staff members to fulfil contracted services and grant-funded activities.

The principal activities during the year included:

#### Information and Advice services (I&A)

The Ceredigion Housing Support Grant funded dementia pilot was renewed for another year. Long-term tender opportunities are anticipated in Autumn 2024.

Enhancing Pembrokeshire grant: ACD delivered another successful service, focusing on providing Information and Advice to the communities of Pembrokeshire. This initiative aimed to reach individuals who were previously isolated and unable to access office-based support.

Pembrokeshire I&A Small Grant Funding: The funding continued at the same levels as in previous years. Meetings were held with commissioners to advocate for additional funds to meet the ever-increasing needs.

Connecting Carmarthenshire: The Carmarthen County Council Preventative Service for older people and adults with physical disabilities commenced, delivering a highly successful first year of interventions that received praise from commissioners.

Shell Funded Benefits Checks: The team completed over 550 sessions in another successful year of providing benefits checks funded by Shell.

Ceredigion Services: Services in Ceredigion were again funded from reserves and small additional available funds. Efforts continue to raise awareness of the need to fund this essential service in Ceredigion.

Achievements and performance (continued)

#### Befriending Life Links

The service continued into its fourth year, meeting all milestones set by the Welsh Government. ACD will now gather evidence of need to apply for a replacement service as the demand for befriending support and interventions to address loneliness and isolation is increasing.

#### Veterans' services

ACD's support for older veterans continues to grow, with additional funding secured and the award of the Armed Forces Covenant Fund - Employer Recognition Scheme (Silver) being a highlight of the year.

#### Digital services

ACD's reputation for delivering digital services has continued to grow, with the adaptation of innovative technologies enhancing its presence across the three counties. Established programmes are now in place in Pembrokeshire.

The demonstration of Virtual Reality as a wellbeing tool has gained momentum, with funding received from Adferiad Carers Information Service to deliver interventions across Carmarthenshire. This success led to a trial and subsequent funding to deliver similar services in Ceredigion.

ACD is approaching the final year of delivery under its Santander digital financial funding. This Digital Support Service has continued to provide support across the three counties.

#### Mental health service provision

The Social Inclusion Service, funded by Hywel Dda University Health Board, entered its first year of a potential five-year delivery period. ACD aims to support around two hundred people to reduce loneliness and isolation and prevent crises.

#### Byw Adref

After a financial review and the implementation of an increased hourly rate, the service has continued to support residents of Ceredigion with help around the home. The revision of fees has ensured that the project is now financially sustainable and running independently.

#### <u>Advoçacy</u>

ACD continues to collaborate with partners to deliver advocacy services in Ceredigion. During the year, our sole advocate left the service, but ACD successfully recruited an excellent replacement who will continue delivery for the contract term.

#### Trustees' report (continued) for the year ended 31 March 2024

#### Financial review

The overall net surplus for the year was £1,996, including a net deficit of £75,313 on unrestricted funds and a net surplus of £77,309 on restricted funds, after transfers. Overall income rose by 20% in the year, whilst expenditure increased by 14%. As indicated last year, more senior management time is now spent on raising additional funds, through which a greater proportion of administrative and overhead costs is being recovered, commensurate with the continued growth of the organisation. Further work is planned in order to seek ways of meeting overhead costs in full.

At 31 March 2024, total reserves were £819,476, of which £204,538 represented balances on restricted funds (31 March 2023: £817,480 total, with £127,229 restricted).

The Finance & Scrutiny Committee deals with the detail of proposals which have a significant financial impact on the charity.

#### Reserves policy

The charity's free reserves, excluding fixed assets, at the year end were £589,586.

During the year, trustees re-evaluated the purposes for which unrestricted funds were being held, and agreed a forward-looking review of designated reserves. At 31 March 2024, funds were held in five distinct elements, and trustees will continue to review these on a regular basis:

- (a) to mitigate the risks of unplanned closure or a substantial reduction in activities arising from an unforeseen loss of income, and these include statutory redundancy obligations, binding lease commitments and dilapidations provision. These costs were updated as a result of staffing and leasing changes.
- (b) to enable service development opportunities identified within the strategic business plan to be funded, with the aims of diversifying the number of income streams and funders, enhancing services in the community, and spreading the organisation's risks across more projects.
- (c) to support the charity's marketing strategy by funding a marketing manager and associated costs.
- (d) to fund a core information and advice service in Ceredigion, which is the one area of Dyfed without a local authority-funded I&A presence, which trustees consider to be a crucial component of the charity's activities. Further discussions are planned with the local authority in this regard.
- (e) to ensure that there continues to be sufficient funding to retain the charity's veteran's coordinator, supplementing partial finding from other grant sources.

Trustees decided to hold an amount of 'working capital' to smooth out the way by which we receive grant funding, much of which is quarterly in arrears, and that this should be in the range of between three and six months' operating expenditure, which would give a base figure of between around £461K and £922k based on budgeted expenditure, At 31 March 2024, the value of free reserves (including designated reserves) was £589,586, which is around 3.8 months' operating costs. The trustees are looking at revising the reserves policy so that closure costs (particularly potential redundancy costs and lease commitments) are treated explicitly as a part of free reserves, as the trustees are satisfied that the charity will continue to operate as a going concern for the foreseeable future. Moreover, they will continue to consider designating further sums from free reserves to enable the short-term funding of services whilst alternative grant or contract funding is being sought, with the proviso that free reserves should not fall below three months' operating expenditure.

#### Investment policy

As a substantially larger amount of the charity's assets was being held in the main bank current account, trustees recognised this as a growing risk, given the limit of £85K per financial institution under the Financial Services Compensation Scheme. They agreed to diversify bank holdings to mitigate this risk, whilst also generating some additional investment income for the charity, through the CAF Bank investment platform managed by Flagstone Investment Management Ltd. At a cost of 0.25% of invested funds, this continues to generate additional net income whilst spreading the risk across a number of institutions.

#### **Future Plans**

Age Cymru Dyfed remains committed to securing additional funding to enhance our services in line with our revised strategic business plan for 2024 to 2029. The charity's strategic objectives are to:

- 1. Reduce loneliness and isolation,
- 2. Improve mental and physical health and wellbeing,
- 3. Encourage and sustain independence, choice, and control,
- 4. Reduce social, financial, and digital exclusion and inequality.

We aim to achieve these objectives through a sustainable funding strategy, while continually transforming our ways of working.

In 2024, the successful acquisition of additional long-term funding for Dementia Services has expanded our staff knowledge base. Looking ahead, we anticipate securing further long-term tenders over the next 12 months and are actively exploring options to refresh and expand our befriending services.

ACD is also focused on increasing staff retention and job security by upskilling our team and maintaining a core of highly qualified, knowledgeable staff capable of transitioning across various funding streams.

Moving forward, ACD will continue to pursue long-term contracts, building on our strong relationships with the health board and county councils. This strategy will foster ongoing growth, ensuring the long-term stability of both our services and workforce.

#### Statement of trustees' responsibilities

#### Report of the Independent Auditors to the Trustees of Age Cymru Dyfed

#### Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Age Cymru Dyfed (the 'charity') for the year ended 31 March 2024 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet, the Cash Flow Statement and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

#### In our opinion the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the state of the charity's affairs as at 31 March 2024 and of its incoming resources and application of resources, for the year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice; and

#### **Basis for Opinion**

#### 1 Accounting policies

#### Basis of accounting

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) and with the Charities Act 2011.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

There has been no change to the accounting policies since last year.

No changes have been made to the accounts for previous years.

#### Going concern

The trustees are satisfied that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

#### Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when the charity becomes entitled to the resources, if it is more likely than not that the trustees will receive the resources and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

#### Grants and donations

Grants and donations are only included in the SOFA when the charity has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

Where grants are related to performance and specific deliverables, they are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance.

Donated goods for resale are valued at the amount actually realised upon their sale.

Donated assets, facilities or services are valued at their estimated value to the charity. This is the price that the charity estimates it would pay in the open market for equivalent items; or services and facilities of equivalent utility to the charity.

#### **Fixed Asset Investments**

Investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. The SOFA includes the net gains and losses arising on revaluations and disposals throughout the year.

#### **Expenditure and liabilities**

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Liabilities are recognised where it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out the resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

#### Taxation

As a charity the organisation benefits from rates relief and is generally exempt from income tax and capital gains tax but not from VAT. Irrecoverable VAT is included in the cost of those items to which it relates.

#### 1 Accounting policies continued

#### Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets costing more than £500 are capitalised and included at cost including any incidental expenses of acquisition. Gifted assets are shown at the value to the charity on receipt. Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost on a straight line basis over their expected useful economic lives as follows:

Equipment, fixtures and fittings: over 5 years

Improvements to short leasehold premises: in accordance with the lease terms.

#### **Pensions**

The charity operates a defined contribution scheme and makes contributions to such schemes for the benefit of its eligible employees. The costs of contributions are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year they are payable.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the accounts.

#### Leases

Rents under operating leases are charged on a straight line basis over the lease term or to an earlier date if the lease can be determined without financial penalty.
