The trustees, who are also directors under company law, present their report and financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2020.

The trustees confirm that the financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the memorandum and articles of association and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities: SORP applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102.

The object of the charity as stated in the Memorandum and Articles of Association (24th June 2011) is as follows:

To promote the following purposes for the benefit of the public and/or older people in and around East London namely: City, Tower Hamlets, Newham, Hackney, Waltham Forest, Havering, Redbridge and Barking and Dagenham

- Advancing education;
- Preventing or relieving sickness, disease or suffering in older people (whether emotional, mental or physical);
- · Promoting equality and diversity;
- Assisting older people in need by reason of ill-health, disability, financial hardship, social exclusion or other disadvantage; and
- Such other charitable purposes for the benefit of older people as the trustees may from time to time decide.

Chief Executive's introduction

The last year for Age UK East London ended as the lockdown for the COVID 19 pandemic had just begun. By the end of March our organisation had radically transformed, increasing all essential face to face front line services, introducing a food distribution service and expanding virtual contact to reach all the older people we work alongside. Our hospital, home and care and handyperson staff kept working on the front line in the epicentre of the pandemic, supporting residents often in extremely traumatic circumstances.

We work across boroughs which have the highest rate of pensioner poverty in England and we were already acutely aware of the impact on wellbeing of socio-economic status which is further exacerbated by ageism and structural racism. The pandemic only revealed the inequalities and inequities we already knew existed and, after so many years of austerity, we could see that our boroughs would be hit hard by the virus.

Extraordinary times called for an extraordinary response. Whilst we saw many services withdraw to complete virtual delivery, we were able to respond with speed and agility because of the intensive work we had completed over the last few years focusing on flexible person centred care and by innovating our programmes to attack the digital divide. We went into the crisis confident that we were financially sustainable and well governed.

Thanks to our new hospital service in Whipps Cross and our new City Connections programme our reach has increased by 20% this year enabling us to connect with over 9,531 older residents. As the first phase of the pandemic began, this reach and our flexibility enabled me to bring the front line intelligence gained from staff and residents into the wider system to influence and shape responses during rapid change.

Looking forward to the next financial year will need a new strategy based on our experience of the impact of COVID and to prepare for the consequences on the physical and mental health of older people. Underpinning this will be a focus on the inequity of access to vital services as authorities continue to develop virtual solutions that disadvantage older residents.

Chair's Review

In 2014 the three charities of Age Concern Newham, Tower Hamlets and Hackney took the extremely brave step to unite under a unique charitable model called a United Direction. Their focus was to ensure that the most vulnerable and isolated older people across East London would have a reliable and caring place to turn to for support.

In the past 6 years much time and effort has been spent meeting this ambition and building a secure and robust charity with the highest standards of governance and the energy and big heart to do the most good we can with the resources we have.

At the start of 2020, I attended an all staff meeting and reflected to the Board that the inspirational approach, kindness, 'can do attitude' and constant strive to support those who were falling through the cracks, by the entire staff team, was something to feel very proud of.

For a great many older people in East London COVID put them at risk, they were frightened, isolated and struggling to access basic support, including food. Without exception the staff of AUKEL responded to this. They were flexible, they worked flat out, they did all that they could to help people feel valued, supported and not alone.

AUKEL's response to supporting its beneficiaries during COVID was possible thanks to the outstanding Senior Team, and their ability to constantly place the client at the centre of their approach as to how best to deliver services. The trusted partnerships and relationships with Commissioners that had been firmly built over years, the solid financial position and the outward facing approach have ensured that AUKEL not only met the needs of thousands of older people in 2019/20 but that they can continue to do this in the future.

Responding to the COVID-19 pandemic has been exhausting for the staff of AUKEL, but for older people across East London the devastating impact of isolation, of feeling abandoned, of losing access to the places that enabled support such as mosques and churches and of losing friends, partners and family, drives the AUKEL team onwards to work with community leaders to address these challenges.

AUKEL is committed to working alongside older people to ensure that their resilience and contribution to the community is valued and to find innovative ways to reach and help those who need support.

Thank you to this incredible staff team, the commitment of so many volunteers and to the generous support of the trustees. Everyone stepped up during this time and it is a charity to which it is an honour to belong.

We have over 1,000 members of our 3 Older Persons Reference Groups in Hackney, Tower Hamlets and Newham. They meet regularly to have their voices heard to influence decision makers, make services more appropriate, to find out about changes in their borough and to socialise.

We continue to develop strong partnerships to facilitate feedback loops for older people so they can quality improve services. An example of this was the OPRG project with Hackney CCG reviewing how to effectively communicate falls prevention to older residents.

During the pandemic we have held virtual meetings and increased our mail outs and newsletters to help people stay safe and keep up with rapidly changing information. We also began a deep community research study led by older people on the impact of the pandemic on older residents and will publish the report in the autumn 2020.

In 2019-20 we secured over £2,000,000 for older people by making sure they were claiming everything they are entitled to.

The boroughs we work across have the highest levels of income deprivation for older people in the entire country. Tower Hamlets has the highest level of pensioner poverty in England and Hackney has the second.

We deliver advice, in our centres, in GP surgeries, in hospitals and in people's homes where mobility is a barrier to access. During lockdown we also delivered advice in the hotels assigned to rough sleepers and people discharged from hospital who were unable to return safely to their homes. Although we shut our drop in advice session, we increased our phone service to 7 days a week.

In addition our advocates delivered **729 hours** of independent advocacy, promoting tools which enable older residents to protect their own rights.

93% of our advice clients said we increased their independence and 96% felt they were treated with dignity



Following hospital discharge our re-admission rate for our clients after 30 days is just 4.71% compared to a national average of 14%. This is an improvement on last year where we achieved 6%

Living and dying in your place of choice as independently as possible for as long as possible is the focus of much of our work in hospitals and older residents' homes.

Our work in homes

We deliver flexible person centred care in older people's homes with a focus on supporting people to stay living safely at home. In addition to working with those who live alone, we also give carers time off by taking over their caring responsibility.

We also provide support right through to those in the **Last Year of Life** including those with dementia and can support relatives and connect the wider circle of friends to wrap care around the resident. Every person has different needs and we foster a culture of 'computer says yes'. As one of our residents in Hackney put it "**When you've met an older person, you've met – just ONE older person".**

Our work in hospitals

We now work in **4 hospitals across East London supporting 2,438 people** home from hospital and providing them with emotional and practical support back home to help get them back on their feet.

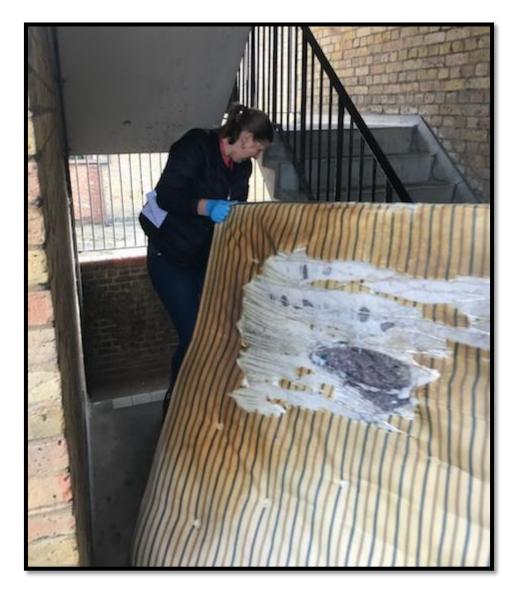
Our newest service at Whipps Cross hospital opened this year and we have continued to innovate these services working holistically joining up our own programmes to provide a one stop shop with easy access to **home support**, **benefits advice**, **handypersons**, **befriending and links into local activities**.

1,400 homes were made safer with grab rails, key safes, beds moved and gardens cleared through our handy person service.

We continued to expand our range of support following discharge which has measurably increased our impact. The complexity of older residents' circumstances has increased over the last few years and it has been essential to do whatever is required to restore the safety and dignity of people's experience of later life.

Extra support - COVID 19

During the first weeks of the pandemic in March we joined the central discharge teams in all our hospitals and, as shops were emptied and queues were round the block, we introduced a food distribution service to provide patients with welfare packages, food and basic essentials such as soap and toilet rolls. Discharge had to be rapid and our focus was on supporting people to be comfortable and safe with the security of knowing that we would help with whatever they needed.

We were contacted by phone, post, Facebook and by notes through our door. One women slipped a note under our door in Newham saying she urgently needed food and when we dropped off two boxes for her she said **'it's just like Xmas and I'm six years old!"**. As we were able to provide humanitarian support so quickly, during lockdown we worked with the health and social care system to help whoever was in need including rough sleepers, those with no recourse to public funds and women escaping domestic violence.

We could not have achieved such an impact with such speed without the support of our Chair Lucy Bracken and her family who volunteered throughout lockdown resourcing and collecting food and essentials to be sent out to patients and residents.

From our digital MOT of 200 residents we found that 57% had a smart device but no internet. 46% said they would like to be connected and learn how to use the internet if they could afford it.

Across our boroughs older residents have always faced barriers in accessing the right services and information whether this be due to reduced mobility, sensory impairment, memory loss, poverty, digital poverty and language difference.

AUKEL has always supported older people to get online and have equity of access to services and benefits. We have been running IT classes for a number of years and deliver training at home to people who are housebound.

Although we are committed to continuing face to face services, activities and events we have become increasingly concerned about the increase of virtual only access to other information and services which may deny older people vital help and lead to further social isolation and ill health.

Closing the digital divide

We know that there is not one solution to connecting older people to the internet but poverty and lack of relevant training plays a big part. During lockdown, digital poverty became a critical issue and we successfully trialled a number of different approaches to getting older people connected.

We have now introduced a **digital buddies** programme and secured more funding to supply devices and sim cards. We have built an online community centre (https://caxtonhall.wordpress.com) which offers a library of activities as well as a schedule of 'live' online and telephone sessions. We have tested this across small groups and 92% were 'very happy' with the sessions; 84% felt 'OK' or 'Confident' accessing these sessions; 74% said they didn't need any further IT training in order to participate. This demonstrates that older people are capable of developing the skills and that we know the best ways to teach them.

Language

Older residents in East London speak many different first languages and each borough has its own profile of language needs. We have translated all our leaflets into Bengali, Sylheti, Hindi, Somali, Urdu, Turkish and Yiddish as part of a quality improvement project to improve the inclusivity of our own services (see ethnicity chart on page 25). By improving access to our own services we will be able to improve access to health and social care services and everything the boroughs have to offer.

We also offer English speaking conversation classes which are well attended. During lockdown we have continued these sessions by training members to use zoom which has been highly effective at keeping the group together. We will have learning from this which we will feedback to health and social care services. Meaning is nuanced and can be lost more easily when communicating virtually if English is not your first language without the benefit of body language and this can have a significant impact on the accuracy of assessments and diagnosis.

Across our boroughs we run many programmes of activities and events to connect residents including outreach projects like LinkAge and our community ambassador project as part of City Connections. We create our own events or signpost to others.

Older residents have told us that they feel increasingly excluded from their community and that they don't feel like they 'belong' anywhere. In addition to running local events and activities to tackle **loneliness and isolation**, we recognise that building a sense of neighbourhood requires all residents to come together and we have increased our intergenerational work this year to help facilitate this.

Although we had to shut our centres during lockdown we were able to keep in contact and organise safe wellbeing walks. We will move to 'bubble' group meetings as soon as is safe and have prepared outside areas with seating and heating.

Our new City Connections service

In 2019 we launched City Connections to link residents and workers to services and information building a new website with a digital social prescribing platform. The service integrates a portfolio of services including a memory café, carers service, care navigation and community assessors.







We blitzed the City with events and publicity, welcoming over **1000 residents in the first few months and completing 235 community assessments.**



We have had fantastic support developing the new service from the Corporation, residents and businesses in the City. We were accepted onto the digital Leaders top 100 list in 2018 and this new service continues our journey in developing new systems to build communities.

We have over 250 active volunteers who add huge value to our work and the wellbeing of residents.

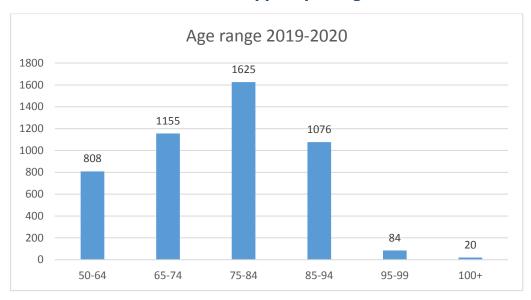

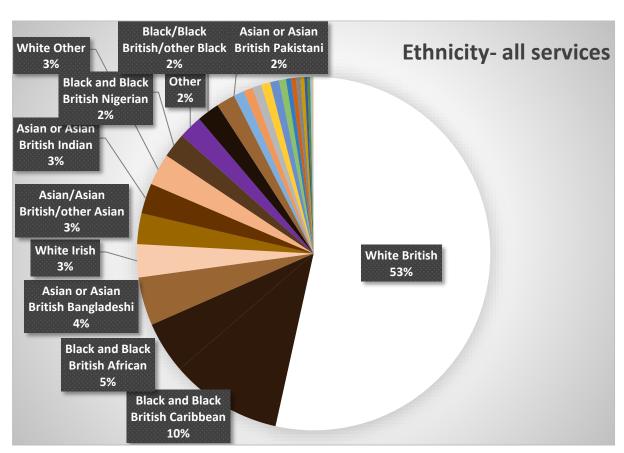

Purpose and aim

AUKEL aims to improve the health and wellbeing of all older people and their carers in East London by providing practical and emotional support in their homes, in hospital and in the community.

Objectives

- To encourage choice, opportunity and independence for older people and to be there when help is most needed.
- To provide safe, friendly and inclusive services.
- To ensure that older people are aware of, and have access to, the benefits to which they are entitled.
- To work in partnership and co-operation with other organisations and work towards a step change in attitudes, service planning and the delivery of all services for older people.
- To seek out and represent the stated needs and wishes of all older people and carers in East London and to work in partnership to ensure their voices are heard.
- To prevent social isolation and strive to combat loneliness.
- To adapt older people's environments to suit their changing needs.
- To champion volunteering and its benefits and reflect the diversity of our communities.
- To embrace new technologies and strategies to improve the delivery of our services and to expand opportunities for income generation.
- To value equality and diversity and to develop the skills and talents of our staff.
- To ensure all our activities maximise the organisation's resources.

Financial review

Overview

We are pleased with our end of year position.

Our turnover was £1.9m and we made a £6k unrestricted surplus.

Age UK East London group made an overall operating surplus in 2020 of £89,157 (2018: a deficit of £16,750). This operating surplus arose from income of £1,947,618 (2019: £1,896,277) less expenditure of £1,858,461 (2019: £1,913,027). Excluding the restricted element of the operating surplus, the unrestricted year end result was a surplus of £5,972.

Total funds at 31^{st} March 2020 are £774,517 (2019: £685,360), of which £669,898 were unrestricted (2019: £663,926).

Income

The group received 94% of its income for its charitable activities, the majority of which relates to local authority contracts, followed by hospital contracts then grants then sales income. Less than 1% of group income was received as donations.

Overall income increased by 3% for the group in the year.

Our Head Office in Russia Lane is given to us as a gift in kind but no information is yet available for us to value this in the accounts.

Expenditure

The group's expenditure on charitable activities decreased by 3% in the year, reflecting the increased spend down of brought forward restricted fund balances in the prior year. 76% of total expenditure relates to staff costs. Individual services accounted for 68% of expenditure and with 32% on community services.

Subsidiary entities

The subsidiary entities no longer have any ongoing charitable projects, as all activities have been transferred to Age UK East London as the parent. All assets and liabilities have been transferred to Age UK East London. The net assets at year end of the subsidiary entities were as follows:

Reserves

The Trustees are responsible for ensuring that the Charity maintains an appropriate level of reserves to meet future risks and manage cash flow. The Trustees review reserves annually and decide an appropriate level of free reserves mandatory for the governance of the Charity.

In considering the funds to be retained by the charity, Trustees have been mindful of the fact AUKEL has substantial fixed costs in terms of staff and premises, and a low diversity of income streams, together with low levels of guaranteed funding beyond one to three years. Additionally AUKEL does not have a substantial asset base against which to borrow. These indications of higher financial risk have been borne in mind by the Trustees in setting AUKEL's reserves policy.

Trustees have taken the decision to designate a fund of £392,532 to meet the full costs of closure, should this be required. A further designation remains of £10,000 for consultancy relating to property.

Free reserves are defined by the Charity Commission as unrestricted funds expendable at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the Charity's objects. If part of an unrestricted fund is earmarked for a particular project it may be designated as a separate fund, but the designation has an administrative purpose only, and does not legally restrict the Trustees' discretion to apply the fund.

Free reserves have been calculated as follows:

Total Reserves: £774,517 Less Fixed Assets: (£81,831)Less Restricted Funds: (£106,619)Less Designated funds: (£402,432)Equals Free Reserves: £183,635

This represents 14.7 weeks of anticipated future unrestricted expenditure, and falls within the Trustees reserves policy of maintaining up to 6 months of unrestricted expenditure as free reserves, in addition to the designated costs of closure. The trustees feel that this policy holds valid in the context of covid-19.

Future plans

Throughout the pandemic we have continued to provide crucial services to older residents of East London. Naturally the pressure of the pandemic has increased the level of need in our boroughs, so our future plans are based on higher ongoing levels of demand. We are continually reviewing service delivery models for the year ahead as circumstances change, and are looking at options to deliver Care Act Advocacy and campaigning work.

Principal risks and uncertainties

The Trustee Board systematically reviews risks faced by the group. An annual assessment is undertaken, the most recent full review having taken place in December 2019; additionally, significant organisational risks are reviewed regularly throughout the year by the Finance Sub Committee, and regular reports are made to the Board as necessary.

The two key risks for the group are overreliance on statutory funding and the sustainability of paid for services. We are diversifying our funding streams and reviewing our operations to streamline our processes to mitigate these risks.

At the outbreak of Covid-19 a distinct risk register was drawn up in response to the pandemic, shared with all local authority and hospital partners, and used as a framework for other community groups pandemic response. In addition to infection control measures we gave front line staff a temporary salary increase of 10%, gave working from home staff a working at home allowance, and acquired death in service insurance at three times annual salary. We did not furlough any staff. We expect an increased demand for services, and a shrinking economy.

Structure, governance and management

Age UK East London (AUKEL) was created as a charity in November 2011 and established as a company in June 2011. The charities of Age Concern Hackney, Age Concern Newham and Age Concern Tower Hamlets are linked by a Uniting Direction via common trusteeship issued in December 2011.

We were accepted in September 2012 as a Brand Partner of Age UK, the national charity formed by a merger of Age Concern England and Help the Aged.

Governing Document

The Charity's operations are governed by its memorandum and articles of association (M&AA) dated 29 June 2011.

The constituent charities adopted identical M&AA during December 2011.

Organisational structure

Age UK East London is the parent charity of three subsidiary charities, and a trading subsidiary (all dormant):

- Age Concern Hackney,
- Age Concern Newham, &
- Age Concern Tower Hamlets
- Age Concern Newham Trading Ltd

All four entities share the same Board of Trustees. All staff are employed directly by AUKEL. There are no transactions in the subsidiaries to the parent charity.

Decision making

The Board of Trustees:

Full Board Meetings are held bi-monthly. They are attended by all available Trustees, the Chief Executive Officer and both Senior Directors. The meetings are minuted by an independent recorder. All reports and papers are submitted three days before the meeting. The Board receives reports from all the departments and has an opportunity to ask questions. The Board receives a report from the CEO and has an opportunity to ask questions. Decisions are minuted and taken by a vote of the whole Board. Any decisions on the following will be reviewed by the whole Board: budget, spend, policy, marketing, safeguarding, new projects.

The Finance Sub Committee:

Meetings are held monthly. Three Trustees and the Chair, the CEO and the Finance Director attend. All reports are submitted five days before the meeting. The meetings are minuted and the decisions are shared with all Trustees.

Chair and CEO meetings:

Informal meetings are held between the Chair and CEO weekly. Decisions are circulated to the Board of Trustees by email should they be required.

The Board delegate day-to-day management of the charity, and take advice from the CEO and SMT:

Director of Services: Larissa Howells
Director of Finance Ruth Jenkins

Public Benefit

The Board have due regard for the Charity Commission's guidance on Public Benefit, taking it into account in all relevant decision-making. The report above describes how the Board have carried out the charities purposes for the public benefit this year.

Brand partnership

Age UK East London is a brand partner of Age UK. The Brand Partner Agreement allows AUKEL to use the brand and to apply for funding from Age UK and for support. AUKEL is therefore restricted to carry out the work of the charity within the three boroughs of Hackney, Newham and Tower Hamlets. AUKEL can work in other areas with the consent of the respective Age UK brand partner, and does not have to discuss with Age UK the work that it delivers or its strategic plan.

Appointment of trustees

The Board of Trustees is a skills based Board, with expertise in all areas that are essential for the breadth of the work of AUKEL. The Chair and CEO regularly review the succession planning on the Board, with the term ends of individual Trustees in mind. New Trustees are advertised through 'Reach', a reputable on-line agency for the voluntary sector, through LinkedIn, and through networks such as The East London Business Alliance and through advertisement on the AUKEL website.

Trustee induction and training

During the recruitment process, new Trustees are briefed by the Chair and CEO, including a discussion of their responsibilities and legal obligations. After the recruitment is completed, newly appointed Trustees are invited to meet with each Director and Team Leader and also to visit one of the hospitals where we provide Home and Settle services. They are also provided with the staff handbook, containing the main operating policies of the Charity.

Related parties and relationships with other organisations

As noted above Age UK East London (AUKEL) acts as parent charity to the dormant charities of Age Concern Hackney, Age Concern Newham and Age Concern Tower Hamlets, which are linked by a Uniting Direction via common trusteeship issued in December 2011. Additionally Age Concern Newham Trading Ltd is a dormant subsidiary, whose cash balance has been consolidated into the group.

AUKEL is a Brand Partner of Age UK, the national charity formed by a merger of Age Concern England and Help the Aged.

Remuneration policy for key management personnel

The Board of Trustees sets the remuneration of the Chief Executive Officer and the Directors of Age UK East London.

The Chair of the Trustees makes a recommendation to the board on the overall level of pay for the CEO and Directors on an annual basis. The Board uses three principles to ensure pay is proportionate and fair: comparisons within the organisation; comparisons with the sector; and comparisons with similar organisations.

The ratio of pay between the highest paid employee (the CEO) and the lowest paid employee will not exceed a ratio of 6:1.

A bi-annual assessment of sector pay for each of the key roles is completed. This assessment reviews market pay of organisations of a similar size and complexity working in similar environments, using openly sourced pay data and salary surveys. The bi-annual assessment also takes account of pay data for similar organisations such as local authorities, using openly sourced pay data and salary surveys.

The salary assessments provide a range of salary options and Age UK East London aims to pay at the median point of these.

Annual appraisals are completed for key management personnel. For the CEO, this is completed by the Chair and one other trustee and for the Directors by the CEO. Whilst Age UK does not operate performance related pay, performance is used as a guide on where remuneration is set in line with the salary assessments.

Statement of responsibilities of the trustees

The trustees (who are also directors of charitable company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the trustees' annual report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- Observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- State whether applicable UK Accounting Standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements
- · Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information included on the charitable company's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

Members of the charity guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charity in the event of winding up. The total number of such quarantees at 31 March 2020 was 10 (2019: 9). The trustees are members of the charity but this entitles them only to voting rights. The trustees have no beneficial interest in the charity.

In so far as the trustees are aware:

- There is no relevant audit information of which the charitable company's auditors are unaware; and
- The trustees have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the auditors are aware of that information.

a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102 - effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

The charitable company meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy or note.

The financial statements consolidate the results of the charity and its wholly owned subsidiaries, Age Concern Hackney, Age Concern Newham and Age Concern Tower Hamlets on a line by line basis.

The trading subsidiary of Age Concern Newham, Age Concern Newham Trading Company Limited, is also consolidated by virtue of its inclusion in its parent.

The results of the individual subsidiaries can be seen in note 10.

b) Going concern

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charitable company's ability to continue as a going concern. Key judgements that the charitable company has made which have a significant effect on the accounts include the confirmation of the going concern status of the subsidiary charities and company. The trustees do not consider that there are any sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next reporting period.

c) Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and that the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred. Income received in advance for the provision of specified service is deferred until the criteria for income recognition are met.

For legacies, entitlement is taken as the earlier of the date on which either: the charity is aware that probate has been granted, the estate has been finalised and notification has been made by the executor(s) to the charity that a distribution will be made, or when a distribution is received from the estate. Receipt of a legacy, in whole or in part, is only considered probable when the amount can be measured reliably and the charity has been notified of the executor's intention to make a distribution. Where legacies have been notified to the charity, or the charity is aware of the granting of probate, and the criteria for income recognition have not been met, then the legacy is a treated as a contingent asset and disclosed if material.

d) Donations of gifts, services and facilities

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item or received the service, any conditions associated with the donation have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102), volunteer time is not recognised so refer to the trustees' annual report for more information about their contribution.

On receipt, donated gifts, professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

The charity recieves the head office premises on Russia Lane as a gift in kind, but is unable to value this reliably.

e) Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

1 Accounting policies (cont)

f) Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose. Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

g) Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified under the following activity headings:

- Costs of raising funds comprise of trading costs and the costs incurred by the charitable company in inducing third parties
 to make voluntary contributions to it, as well as the cost of any activities with a fundraising purpose.
- Expenditure on charitable activities includes the costs of delivering services, exhibitions and other educational activities undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs.
- Other expenditure represents those items not falling into any other heading.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

h) Allocation of support costs

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Support costs include back office costs, finance, personnel, payroll and governance costs which support the company's charitable programmes and activities. These costs have been allocated between cost of raising funds and expenditure on charitable activities. The bases on which support costs have been allocated are set out in note 5.

i) Operating leases

Rental charges are charged on a straight line basis over the term of the lease.

j) Tangible fixed assets

Items of equipment are capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £1,000. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write down the cost of each asset to its estimated residual value over its expected useful life. The depreciation rates in use are as follows:

k) Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

I) Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

m) Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

n) Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value.

o) Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme on behalf of its employees. Contributions are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period in which they are payable.

- p) Critical accounting judgements and estimates and key sources of estimation uncertainty
 In the application of these accounting policies, the Trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions
 about the carrying value of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources.

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. Although these estimates are based on management's best knowledge of the amount, events or actions, actual results may ultimately differ from those estimates. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects current and future periods. The trustees consider the following items to be areas subject to estimation and judgement:

Depreciation

The useful economic lives of tangible fixed assets are based on management's judgement and experience. When management identifies that actual useful economic lives differ materially from the estimates used to calculate depreciation, that charge is adjusted retrospectively. Although tangible fixed assets are significant, variances between actual and estimated useful economic lives will not have a material impact on the operating results. Historically, no changes have been required.

Legacies

Accruing for income derived from legacies where complicated issues surrounding the measurement of the group's entitlement to income existed at the year-end. There have been no legacy recognition or measurement requirements this year.

In the view of the Trustees, no assumptions concerning the future or estimation uncertainty affecting assets or liabilities at the balance sheet date are likely to result in a material adjustment to their carrying amounts in the next financial year.

These accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the Charity's financial statements.
