2016/17 has been a very challenging year for us as we struggled to find sufficient income to keep pace with rising costs. This culminated at the end of the year in the start of a restructuring programme aimed at removing around £100,000 of cost from the charity whilst still protecting our services to older people in the city.

Sadly this meant saying goodbye to a number of valued colleagues as a result of redundancy. But, even with these difficulties, we have still achieved some amazing things during the year which are detailed in this review. Everyone has responded magnificently to help us create a sustainable future for the charity in the years ahead.

My sincere thanks, as well as those of our Trustees, go to all our staff and volunteers who have made such a difference to the lives of so many people throughout the year.

Achievements 2016/17

Promoting Wellbeing

Our work with local GPs to help their older patients improve their wellbeing as part of the Integrated Care for Exeter programme was extended from three to nine GP practices across the city.



Men in Sheds

The guys at Men in Sheds and Tools Company achieved a staggering £32,000 in sales of refurbished tools and garden implements and a range of handmade wooden items such as bird boxes, garden trugs and benches. All the money raised went back into covering the cost of the project as well as helping towards the charity's overall running costs.



Information and Advice

Our Information and Advice service responded to over 3,350 enquiries during the year and helped older people in Exeter claim an amazing £1,113,445 in additional benefits. Such additional income transforms people's lives by improving their quality of life and the choices that are open to them.



Improving Older People's Support Networks

We won three year funding to be part of research project in partnership with the University of Exeter, University of Milton Keynes and The Open University. We are exploring how the support networks of older people with complex health and social care needs can be better enhanced and sustained through the use of technology.



Volunteers

A total of 340 volunteers supported our work during the year, with 288 active at 31st March 2017. This equates to around 35,000 hour of support each year, which even at minimum wage has a value of over £260,000. Our volunteers are a fantastic resource for the city and the life-blood of the charity.



Dementia Carers Support

We won funding from the Claire Milne Charitable Trust to develop a new support group for carers of people with dementia – around 90 carers are currently supported



Dining Room Facelift

We refurbished the dining rooms at our Cowick Street centre where we serve around 270 lunches every week. Our customers are now able to enjoy a brighter and more pleasant environment in which to enjoy their meals.



BBC Documentary

We were involved in the filming of a BCC documentary with Angela Rippon, "Holding Back the Years" where we highlighted the financial challenges facing so many older people today and the billions that go unclaimed in benefits each year.


