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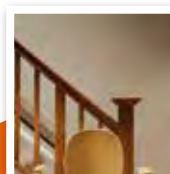
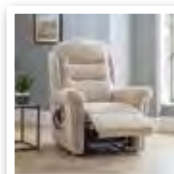

It has been wonderful to be able to join with so many other community organisations across the county to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee this year. On Friday 20th May we added our own little tree to the Queen's Green Canopy, choosing a flowering cherry to match the 25 year old tree planted when our William and Patricia Venton Centre in Northampton was built 25 years ago.

We felt that planting a tree is putting down a memory – not just for our Queen but also for all those who we have supported over the years. Many of our clients are a similar age to the Queen; they have all grown older with her. It was also Dementia Action Week 2022 when we planted the tree. This was, understandably, a subject that we care a lot about since more than half of our day centre clients have been diagnosed with one form or another of dementia.

We were thrilled to welcome the Queen's representative in Northamptonshire, the Deputy Lieutenant John Griffiths-Elsden to plant our little cherry tree at the purpose-built day centre in Northampton. The day centre was built in 1997 and opened by the Queen Mother on 4th November 1998. Arguably over the last 25 years it has become our 'spiritual home'.

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Our centre is now, after all these years, about to be refurbished. It has never been upgraded since it was opened and we are very excited that the heating and air conditioning systems will be upgraded, bathrooms replaced and all internal decoration renewed. Our clients deserve facilities fit for the 21st century and we want them to feel comfortable and valued during their time with us.

We hope that our clients and other visitors to the William and Patricia Venton Centre will enjoy seeing this little tree flourish as a metaphor for the charity, Age UK Northamptonshire, also continuing to flourish in the future.

Covid rules have been relaxed but we are continuing to take extra precautions, building them in to our regular routines to reduce the risk to our clients. Our staff wear facemasks during personal care and regularly test for covid. We continue to carry out more intensive cleaning and check clients' temperatures when they travel on our minibuses. We are adapting and re-arranging seating arrangements in our day centres so that people are no longer socially distanced. They can chat with their friends and play board games or join in arts and crafts activities.

Christine Forskitt's story

Christine Forskitt's husband David is 82 years old and was diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease four years ago, but she says it is easy to see in hindsight that he had been having difficulties for a while. "We were very happy together but were the sort of couple that always had our own hobbies and interests. We were not Howard and Hilda," says Christine. "So it has been quite a change for us to have to spend all our time together."

Covid and the lockdown changed things dramatically for 78 year old Christine. "You felt very cut off and isolated. Even though I have a son and daughter living in Northampton, we weren't able to see them for such a long time. It has been very difficult. My daughter-in-law suggested we contact Age UK Northamptonshire because she knew about the day centre. Things had become hard to manage and I needed a regular break. David enjoys coming here and always

smiles when I ask if he's had a good time. He can't remember what he's done, or what he had for lunch, but he has never once said he didn't want to go.

I feel so sad I have lost the real David. Sometimes I look at David and don't recognise my husband of nearly 60 years. When I feel bogged down I have to remember all the wonderful things David has done over the years, the happy memories I have of him as a father and grandfather, as well as a husband, even fairly recently.

I feel so lucky to have the day centre. It brings benefits for both of us. He enjoys going three days a week and always feels happier after he's been. Now that his condition is deteriorating he's not able to do very much on the days that he's not at the day centre. He gets very tired after even a short walk. I am so grateful and glad to do anything I can to help Age UK Northamptonshire."

Cost of Living Crisis

We are increasingly concerned about the rising cost of living and the effect it is having on those older people who are on low and modest incomes. Prices of everyday items are going up quickly and many pensioners are finding that monthly budgets are not adding up anymore and that they must cut back on their spending. The main price rises are for food and fuel with large increases in April, however, those increased costs are likely to continue to increase given the war in Ukraine and inflationary pressures around the world. Many more of our clients are calling Age UK Northamptonshire to ask for advice and help.

It is described as the worst cost of living crisis in a generation. The biggest change for most has been the increase in the energy cap on 1st April but other price rises will add hundreds of pounds to a household's annual spending. The cap on energy bills has risen by a record-breaking £693, which means the average household is now paying £1,971 a year for gas and electricity (if they pay by direct debit).

Council tax for the average home has risen to almost £2,000, up from £1,898, as local authorities try to make up for income lost during the pandemic.

The cost of the weekly food shop is increasing, with nine in ten people reporting a higher bill at the checkout, according to the Office for National Statistics.

Grocery price inflation hit 5.2% in April this year, rising to its highest level since April 2012. Clothing and footwear prices increased by 8.8% in the year to February 2022, reaching its highest level since records began in 1988. Petrol retailers have been accused of profiteering from the cost of living crisis by raising their profit margins, even when the wholesale price of oil has fallen. The price of petrol was at 161.8 pence per litre in April 2022, compared with 125.5 pence per litre the year before.

There have also been a number of other punishing changes making everyone feel poorer: the rise in National Insurance contributions, rail users hit by the biggest increase in rail fares since records began, the rise in the VAT rate charged on food, accommodation and attractions, the rise in the cost of stamps by 10p to 95p and interest rate rises leading to much higher mortgage rates. The cost of new and second hand cars has also risen substantially.

The energy regulator, Ofgem, has announced that Britain's energy price cap would rise to around £2,800 in October 2022, meaning households will pay 42%, or around £830, more than they do now, making average household energy bills around £1,500 higher than in 2021.

This will pile more pressure on to already struggling households.

It is estimated that two million older households won't have enough income to cover their essential spending in 2022-23 (Age UK research, May 2022).

Many older people report they have no money left for anything but the basics. The majority had significantly cut down their spending but many report they simply cannot cut back any more. People are going to extreme lengths, such as eating just one meal a day or showering once a fortnight, to try to keep costs down.

Of those who have yet to reach retirement age, many are on benefits or unable to find well-paid work and have found themselves just scraping by

until they receive their State Pension.

Older people tell us that they are cutting back or struggling to afford heating, food, petrol, holidays and little luxuries. People are turning their heating off, only making essential trips, buying cheaper food, cancelling holidays and going without the treats that they look forward to.

The Chancellor's package of support – announced on 26th May – will be a relief to many older people, particularly those receiving means-tested benefits or living with a disability. Pensioners will, at a minimum, receive £700 to help with their bills this year.

There will be money off energy bills. All electricity customers will get £400 off their energy bills between October 2022 and April 2023. This is a grant, not a loan – so you don't have to pay this money back through future bills.

Depending on the Council Tax band of property, you may be entitled to a non-repayable £150 from your council. Payments will be made from April 2022 and you'll need to make a claim unless you pay your bill via direct debit, in which case you'll be paid automatically.

This year (2022-23), you may also be entitled to one or more lump-sum payments. These are:

- a £300 Pensioner Cost of Living Payment for households that receive the Winter Fuel Payment. This is a top-up to your Winter Fuel Payment in November/December.
- a £650 Cost of Living Payment for households on means-tested benefits, such as Pension Credit and Universal Credit. You'll be paid in two instalments if eligible. Your eligibility for the first instalment will depend on your circumstances on 25th May 2022.



Check if you are entitled to any additional benefits

- a £150 Disability Cost of Living Payment for those receiving disability benefits, such as Attendance Allowance. To get this payment in September, you must have a successful claim for a disability benefit in progress on 25th May 2022.

None of these payments are taxable and they won't count towards the benefit cap or affect your benefit entitlement.

There is also a Household Support Fund. This is a payment to help those considered most in need with the rising cost of food, energy and water bills. Each local council will decide their own eligibility criteria – though money should be specifically set aside for older people.

We were also relieved to see the Chancellor committed to bringing back the Triple Lock next year.

However, the Chancellor's cost of living crisis support package will cover just a fraction of the cost increases that older people will face this year. The worry is that more older people will turn to debt or cut back on essential items even more.

It is really important that the Government get the message that they need to increase state pension and the benefits system for older people.

For now, the most important thing to do is for older people to check as soon as possible if they are entitled to additional benefits as it may entitle them to an extra payment if they apply in time.

Supporting you to manage your finances

Age UK Northamptonshire is now able to act as an appointee for a person who has lost the mental capacity to manage their own financial affairs. This could be in the short term when someone is in hospital recovering from a major operation or for longer term issues such as dementia.

The appointeeship allows us to open a bank account on someone's behalf to receive any welfare benefits they're entitled to, such as State Pension and Attendance Allowance. We can use these funds to ensure that a client has what they need on a day to day basis and also make necessary payments on their behalf such as household bills.

Jamie Christie is the new Appointeeship Coordinator at Age UK Northamptonshire. He was previously a lawyer specialising in care fees funding and later life planning and is still a member of the Chartered Institute of Legal Executives. He is highly experienced in this field, winning the Junior Lawyer of the year Award at the 2021 Northamptonshire Law Society Awards and being shortlisted in 2017 and 2019 for his work with older people.

We aim to offer comprehensive financial assistance

Denise is able to help people who do have capacity to manage their own affairs, but need some assistance.

The Appointeeship service will run alongside our already established Money Management Support service provided by Denise Anderson. Denise has over 30 years experience of working in banking, and fraud prevention and investigation. She is able to help people who do have the capacity to manage their own affairs, but need some assistance. This could be assistance with setting up or cancelling direct debits or standing orders, cash collection or organising post and paperwork. Denise works closely with Trading Standards and the Police to resolve financial matters for clients.

By providing both Money Management Support and Appointeeship we aim to offer comprehensive financial assistance to older people in Northamptonshire, whether they have capacity and just need a lower level of help, or they do not have capacity and need us to manage their day to day finances for them.

Jamie Christie also offers fixed-fee meetings with friends or family members of loved ones who are starting to require either part-time or full-time care. In these meetings he can provide the information relatives or carers need to confidently move forward in the minefield that is care fees funding.

Home Care Cleaning Service can help

Many older people enjoy living independently in their own home but find that the housework has become too much for them. They might have difficulty standing or carrying things, or maybe they suffer from shortness of breath, so washing the kitchen floor or cleaning the bath is just not possible.

For whatever reason, if you or a relative or neighbour are looking for a reliable person to help you keep your home safe and comfortable, please get in touch with Age UK Northamptonshire on 01604 611200.

We can help with domestic duties in your home and charge £17.50 per hour. This is paid by monthly invoice in arrears. The minimum service we can arrange is one hour per fortnight. Most clients prefer a weekly visit. Please ring us to discuss your requirements.

them. She was struggling to keep on top of the housework because of her arthritis but hadn’t realised that Age UK Northamptonshire might be able to help. Fortunately, her GP referred her to the Falls Management Service who suggested she contact our Home Care Cleaning Service. After a home assessment, the Service Coordinator arranged for Domestic Care Worker Julie Tear to visit every week. Moya says “I couldn’t actually manage without her, in all honesty. It would be a desperate worry if my house was not kept clean, so it provides a certain sense of security knowing that Julie will deal with it.”

Age UK Northamptonshire’s Domestic Care Workers are DBS (Disclosure and Barring Service) checked and have provided references, which have been checked. They can help with domestic duties such as cleaning kitchens and bathrooms, changing beds and vacuuming. They can also do small amounts of washing and ironing and light shopping at local shops.



Rosy says Sonia is a blessing

"It is lovely to have a chat with Julie every week. She has been visiting for around three years now and is utterly and completely reliable," says Moya.

Rosy Daisley says "Sonia is such a blessing." I have always worked and been a bit of a perfectionist about the housework but I have had to accept that I could no longer manage by myself. During the lockdown in 2020 my neighbours were fantastic nearby, and I have some very good friends, but it's good to have a regular cleaner I can rely on. I found out about the service after being referred to another Age UK Northamptonshire service by my GP. I am always so glad to see Sonia when she arrives at my door."

Sonia McKenzie visits Rosy Daisley every week to vacuum the bedroom and the downstairs rooms, ensuring that Rosy does not worry that her home is not being looked after. Sonia says she loves her job as she likes to make a difference. The flexible hours also suit her and she can work in her local area. "I look forward to seeing my clients as much as they look forward to seeing me."

Would you enjoy working for us?

Sara Boon has worked as a Domestic Care Worker for over 15 years, having taken voluntary redundancy from her management role at a bank. After a few months she decided she'd like a part-time job, something local, and responded to an advert in the local Post Office. She says that getting to know her clients and their families, makes the work hugely enjoyable. Knowing that she is making a positive difference every time she visits gives her job satisfaction.

"Several of my clients hardly leave their homes and sometimes I am the only visitor they see that week. They tell me they like it when I come as it keeps them in touch with the outside world," says Sara.

Many people find they lose their confidence as they get older and things that they took for granted when they were younger can feel beyond them. Just knowing that a caring, friendly person will be visiting can make daily life less of a worry. Sara is happy to change the

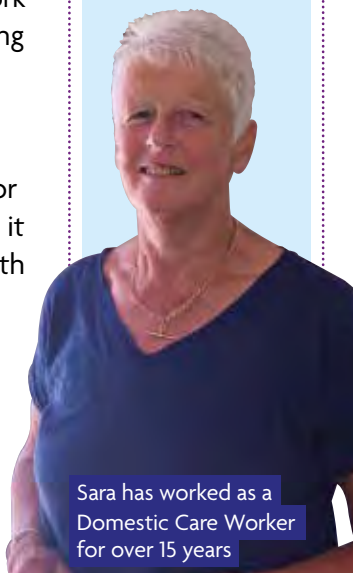

kitchen roll in the dispenser or post a letter, for example. She often picks up a loaf of bread or pint of milk for a client if they tell her they have run out.

Sara says one of her clients in his nineties takes great pride in his appearance and still enjoys regular day trips using public transport. But he cannot stand for long periods and tires easily, so after she has cleaned the kitchen and bathroom she will tackle his ironing pile, ensuring he can enjoy dressing smartly. Sara says she always asks her clients what tasks they would like her to do and how they would like her to do it. "It's important that people feel able to tell me if they'd like something done differently," says Sara.

Prescribing social harmony

The Social Prescribing team has grown within Age UK Northamptonshire from four Social Prescribing Link Workers in 2019 to seven colleagues working in over twenty GP surgeries in the north of the county.

It also includes the exciting launch of SPRING the partnership of social sector organisations, commissioned by Northamptonshire Health and Care Partnership.

If you are new to social prescribing, it empowers people to take control of their health and wellbeing through referral to non-medical 'link workers' who give time and focus on "what matters to me."

SPRING was launched in July 2021 and is designed to improve the wellbeing of people across the county. SPRING works with adults 18+ with long term health conditions. It supports people to make positive changes to better manage their health. One participant said "It's good to know that someone is in my corner."

Two social prescribing link workers cover Brackley, Towcester, Daventry, and surrounding villages. In the North of the county we have three colleagues covering Kettering and Corby. The teams are supported by a lead role and two business support colleagues.

Our link workers are well established over primary and secondary care-partnering with St Mary's and Berrywood hospitals taking referrals leading up to discharge, the local

council, Department of Work and Pensions, housing associations and VCSE partners. Since its launch, Spring has received 408 referrals from 39 sources.

We run community surgeries where participants can meet their link workers, as well as being flexible about arranging home visits.

We have used SPRING funding to set up a range of groups from helping participants with chronic pain together with Northants Chronic Pain Support, a social support group for participants with Autistic Spectrum Conditions in partnership with En-Fold, a craft group, health walks to coffee mornings to reduce isolation. Following a visit with their link worker to a community gardening project a participant said "I did three hours weeding, had a nice time, all friendly, don't feel too bad health wise. I'm so happy, see you next week. Thanks for getting me back at Green Patch – it's done me the world of good."

Mayor of Northampton gets a guided tour

- When Cllr Rufia Ashraf became Northampton's first female Mayor with Bangladeshi heritage in May 2021 she said she hoped to inspire others from a similar background. She was also keen to carry on with her community work and use her experience of working in social services to help improve life for local people. Chief Executive Chris Duff was delighted to welcome the Mayor to The William and Patricia Venton Centre on Friday 22nd April. It is vital for local politicians to be able to see first hand the benefit older people get from being able to socialise and meet up with friends and also take part in fun activities. The Mayor was able to view the facilities at our day centre and talk to staff and clients about the positive difference it makes to many older people every week.

Bathing Equipment Fund - Please help us buy vital equipment, we need to raise £16,000. Around 25% of our day centre clients would love to have a regular bath but do not have suitable facilities or the help they need to bathe safely at home. We need to replace essential but unusable equipment at our day centre in Northampton. It is also a time to remember those social care workers who we sadly lost to Covid-19; an estimated 922 social care workers lost their lives from the virus between March 2020 and May 2021.

Throughout it all, our Extra Help at the End of Life team continued to provide care as usual, visiting and supporting people in their final weeks when they had chosen to be cared for and die at home. Due to the hospitals and hospices having to close their doors to visitors, care at home became more in demand, so that people could be with their loved ones right to the end."

Su told her staff "So much of what you do is about the emotional support and reassurance you give and being behind a mask and unable to stay for a cuppa meant that what you do best was challenged. But as a team you rose to the occasion, giving all that you could to help everybody you visited, whilst at the same time being unable to do that with your own families and friends in lockdown. Like so many other frontline care workers, this was your job and you continued to deliver a service with dedication and compassion. Thank you for all that you did then, and all that you do now."

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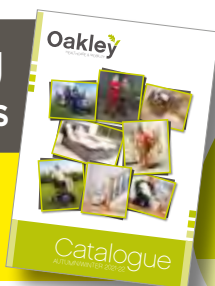


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
