


Our 'why'





In the City of Plymouth there are 47,600 people over the age of 65, with almost 36% of them living alone. There are 3,319 people currently living with dementia and this is predicted to rise to 4,850 people by 2030. There are 7,392 people who provide unpaid care in the city.

The Plymouth Report published in 2019 indicates that a total of 12,614 people over the age of 65 have a long-term illness that limits their day to day life. This number is expected to rise to 18,012 by 2035.

We are a charity that improves the quality of life and independence of older people in the city of Plymouth by preventing the health problems caused by loneliness and the physical challenges of ageing.

Our Covid-19 response



The Covid-19 pandemic was and still is a major challenge for Age UK Plymouth. Our rapid and robust response has seen our role both as a vital supporter of older people, and an important city partner, increase significantly.

A total of 707 older people approached us for the first time during the lockdown. Of these 632 have given consent for their contact details to be retained, and 162 of these are receiving weekly Phone Friends calls.

At the peak of the lockdown, a total of 133 volunteers were working with us, a three-fold increase on the normal number.

Across the months of most need from 24th March to 31st July we:

- ** Set up a Food Box Delivery Service (within three days)
- ** Introduced a Phone Friends Welfare Call telephone service
- ** Expanded our shopping service into Shop n Drop
- ** Introduced on line activities
- ** Worked with Motorbike Group 19 to collect and deliver prescriptions



Working with our supporters





Motorbike Group 19 helped to deliver 277 prescriptions to older people during the first lockdown.



The Devon and Cornwall Chinese Association donated 20,000 face masks, 5000 of which we passed onto local Age UKs in Cornwall, Exeter, Torbay, and Devon.

Salvatori Savino of Bistro Pierre made a large donation of surface wipes and cleaning materials at the start of the first lockdown.




