

Bird facts

1. A flamingo...

...can eat only when its head is upside down.

2. The robin...

...was voted the UK's most popular wild bird.

3. The largest living bird in the world is...

...the Ostrich, which can reach a height of up to 2.7 metres with a wingspan of up to 2 metres (fairly impressive for a bird that can't fly). It will come as no surprise that the Ostrich also lays the largest bird eggs, weighing in at up to 1.5 kilograms.

4. The smallest living bird in the world is...

...the Hummingbird, specifically the Bee Hummingbird, which measures a minute 5.5 centimetres long and weighs no more than 1.9 grams. Another fact about this bird, it also lays the smallest eggs, which are pea-sized.

5. Brown or white?

A chicken with red earlobes will produce brown eggs, and a chicken with white earlobes will produce white eggs.

6. Beats per minute

A bird's heart beats 400 times per minute while resting and up to 1000 beats per minute while flying.

7. The only known poisonous bird in the world is...

...the Hooded Pitohui of Papua, New Guinea. The poison is found in its skin and feathers.

8. Pigeons were the radios of the world wars

With man made communication methods being unreliable and basic it fell to the humble pigeon to transport thousands of messages from the battle lines at the front. Over 300,000 pigeons were used during both World Wars with 32 being awarded The Dickin Medal - the animal world's Victoria Cross.

9. How high?

Penguins can jump as high as 6 feet in the air.

10. The fastest bird on earth is...

...the Peregrine Falcon, when in its hunting dive can reach a Maximum Recorded Airspeed of 389 k/h (242 mph). The fastest bird when in a level flight, is the common Swift which has a maximum recorded airspeed of 169 km/h (105 mph).

11. Flying asleep

An albatross can sleep while it flies. It apparently dozes while cruising at 25 mph.

12. The most talkative bird in the world is...

...the African Gray Parrot. One parrot could say over 800 words. Most species of parrots can learn only 50.

Jack the cat - Chapter 2


Now, as I have said, Jack is an independent cat and he looks after himself but one day this got him into trouble!

One pan salmon and vegetables

You could replace the salmon with another flaky fish. Swap out the vegetables for whatever's in your fridge, or add potatoes for a heartier meal.

Ingredients	
1	Courgette sliced into rounds
1/2	Onion, cut into wedges
1 Cup	Cherry tomatoes
1	Red & yellow pepper, sliced
3 tablespoons	Olive oil
2-3	Salmon fillets, about 4 ounces each
1	Lemon and parsley, optional

Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 450 F and line a baking sheet with parchment paper or aluminum foil. If you don't have these, you can thoroughly grease the pan with vegetable oil.
- **2.** In a large bowl, toss all vegetables with 2 tablespoons of oil and seasoning, then spread them into a single layer on the baking sheet.
- **3.** Nestle your salmon fillets, skin side down, between the vegetables. Brush with remaining olive oil, and top with 2 thin lemon slices each.
- 4. Roast for 12-15 minutes, until salmon is flaky and cooked through.
- **5.** Add 1 salmon fillet and a heaping serving of roasted vegetables to each plate for a healthy and satisfying meal. Enjoy!



Chewy Chocolate Crispie Cakes



Ingredients	
150g	Butter
150g	Golden syrup
3tbsp	Cocoa Powder
200g	Cornflakes

Method

- 1. Take a saucepan and measure in the butter, golden syrup and cocoa powder. Heat gently until all the ingredients have melted and stir with a wooden spoon until the cocoa powder has no lumps and you have a nice smooth mixture.
- 2. In a large mixing bowl measure out the cornflakes. Pour over the chocolate mixture and stir well until every last bit of cornflake is coated in chocolate.
- 3. Take a muffin tin and line with muffin cases. Fill each case with the cornflake mixture pressing down well with the back of the spoon to compact a little.
- 4. Put in the fridge to set for at least an hour.


