# SPOTLIGHT ON WASHINGTON



#### A Visit to Lambton Lunch Club

I arrived at Lambton Village on what was apparently the hottest July day of the year so far, so the shaded main room of the small community hall was a welcome relief from the heat outside. The club had already started and the air was filled with the click of dominoes and happy chatter.



The Lambton club is run on Tuesday's and Friday's by a team of four volunteers led by Ray Turnbull (left). Ray explained that he and fellow volunteer John Grant usually arrive at around 9am and begin to set out the room for the mornings activities. Ray has been a volunteer for many years and has led the group for the last four. Ray said that the leaders role

involves supervising, maintaining a weekly register and some basic bookkeeping as service users pay a nominal fee for the club. Both Ray and John have also completed a food hygiene course, as they serve the lunches when they arrive in from the Bradbury Centre. "The great thing is that up to 17 older people get out the house, meet their friends to socialize and have a hot meal. It's providing this service that gives me a sense of satisfaction." explained Ray.

You would have to go a long way to find someone more intrepid than John Grant (right) John has been a volunteer for about 5 years and as well as his role in the Lambton Lunch Club is also befriender to an older gentleman in the Pavilion care home in Fencehouses. After joining the army at 16 John got a taste for adventure and over the years has climbed



Kilimanjaro, Everest Base Camp, Ben Nevis and Scarfell Pike, as well as canoeing across the English Channel, skiing in the Alps and completing the London and Glasgow marathons and fifteen Great North Runs - and for good measure he recently did a parachute jump from a plane at 10,000 feet. You would think after all of this John might find volunteering in a lunch club a bit tame, but not a bit of it! His enthusiasm for his volunteering is infectious as he explains "I find it enjoyable. Making people happy and the sense of being able to help people, arrange activities and so on, we do our best to look after them when they are here"

On a table next to the stairs a small group of people were concentrating intensely, this was a game of dominoes playing out and at the helm volunteer David Barraclough was keeping the



action flowing. David (left) has been volunteering for about 3 years in total. When he arrives in the morning his first task is to meet and greet the clients and ensure that everyone has refreshments and is settled, his happy and engaging manner mean you cant fail to feel welcome and of course his skills as a domino player also means he is in

demand. David explains "I like to meet people and I enjoy the tasks. I feel I am making a difference and that's why I really enjoy it". I'm reliably informed that David is also a very good singer and there were plenty people singing his praises on the day.

The volunteers also organise a club trip out twice a year, most recently to the coast and out to lunch.

The fourth member of the volunteering team Margaret Hope was not there this day but also plays an important part in keeping this a happy and lively club.

Finally I cannot end without a word of praise for visitor and 'co-opted volunteer' Bertie the Jack Russell. On this hot July day Bertie's Zen-like disposition puts him the category of coolest dude in Washington!
