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2016 / 2017 Annual Review

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Age UK Surrey is a local independent charity established for over 50 years. We provide services to improve the quality of life for people in Surrey aged 50+ and work tirelessly to help reduce isolation and loneliness, improve the health and wellbeing of people, and provide information and advice to enable people to remain independent and informed. We raise almost all our funds locally to support our services.

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An Overview of the Year

Loneliness and isolation affect so many people from all walks of life and of course we are concerned about the impact this has on our older population. Surrey is no different from any other County despite its relative wealth. There are many people living alone in large homes which can be isolated and sometimes in very rural locations. If people are not able to get out and about they can become very lonely. Age UK Surrey has established Making Connections services which aim to tackle this problem.

Our staff spend time with people, getting to know them and finding out what they really want to do and then work with them to achieve their goals. It could be something straightforward like going to the shops, or it could be that someone wants to take up a new hobby. We work with people on a short term basis to get them re-engaged in their local community. There have been some wonderful outcomes where people's lives have been turned around by having this support.

During the year we have unfortunately seen both Age UK Waverley and Age UK Runnymede & Spelthorne close their doors. In order for older residents in those communities to continue to receive localised support, I am pleased that we have been able to absorb much of the work they were doing. We have achieved this with the respective support of Waverley Borough Council and Spelthorne Borough Council for which we are very grateful.

We are incredibly grateful to all our volunteers and have had over 230 who have supported us so much during the year. They have helped in all areas of the Charity, assisted in our Men in Sheds project, supported people on a one to one basis through Making Connections and our hospital activity programme, led walks for us, taught computer skills at our Computer Drop-In Centre and helped in the office to mention a few roles. One group of 'hidden' volunteers is our Trustees who do so much work behind the scenes to make sure we are a well governed Charity. They are always willing to help out when needed using their varied skills and experience. I am very grateful to all of them too.



This Annual Report speaks for itself in celebrating the support that Age UK Surrey has given to older people in Surrey during 2016. Over the past few years, the growth in the number of older people and their increasing longevity, although something to celebrate in its own right, has significantly increased the challenges the Charity has to meet in helping to maintain older people's quality of life. At the same time the funds and resources for running services for older people get tighter and tighter.

In response to these pressures, the Charity has continued to review the services offered to ensure that older people are put first in everything that is done. Specifically the Charity has carried out a thorough review of the standards by which it is governed and managed. Safeguarding, information governance, fund raising criteria and general operational quality standards have been monitored and assessed. Policies and practices have been amended where appropriate.



All of this has been done against the increasing pressures of funding. Whilst on the one hand every effort has been made to improve the efficiency with which the services have been delivered, on the other, we are immensely grateful for the generosity of all our funders and individual supporters which is absolutely vital to the continuance of our work.

We were pleased to be given the opportunity to explain to the Rt Hon Jeremy Hunt, MP for SW Surrey and Secretary of State for Health, what we saw as the issues of older people and what we were doing to help them when he visited our offices on 29th April 2016.

I would like to thank the Hon Lavinia Sealy for being our President this past year and especially for opening her garden on the occasion of Older People's Day. We have said farewell to a number of Trustees and welcomed some new faces during the year. The Board has a good spread of personalities and skills to deploy to the benefit of the Charity and I thank those retired and those who joined us for their time and commitment.

I will be stepping down in September 2017 from my role of chairing the charity. I will by then have been privileged to be associated with Age UK Surrey for over ten years, six as a Trustee and three as Chair. In that time, I have never ceased to be amazed by the Charity's hard working and dedicated staff and volunteers, and I thank them for all they do to help those, who like myself, sometimes struggle with the vagaries of this modern world. And finally, I wish the Charity God Speed in its aim of being a vital support for older people in the years to come.


Volunteers and Staff

At Age UK Surrey we have had over 230 extremely dedicated volunteers this year.



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Independent and Informed

We will work to provide older people, their carers and families with improved access to information and services.

Information and Advice

The Information and Advice team is as busy as ever this year. In total, the team have provided information and advice to 3,537 enquiries this year. Referrals were received by email and telephone, some of which resulted in face-to-face support at home and in the Guildford office. Core funding for this service is provided by Surrey County Council (Better Care Fund) and is comprehensively monitored by them.

We provide helpful information, advice and support on all aspects of welfare benefits to maximise an older person's household income. This includes comprehensive benefit checks and support to complete claims. Through our four year contract (extended to September 2017) with Surrey Disabled People's Partnership on the Get Wise benefits project, funded by Surrey County Council, the team secured £2,263,056 of extra benefits this year for older people in the County.

Our team of staff were supported by 13 volunteers who have worked on the project along with the staff team.

Advocacy

A total of 208 people received advocacy support from our team of 17 volunteer Advocates, one professional Advocate and two part-time Advocates. It was the fifth and last year of our contract with Surrey Disabled People's Partnership.

One Stop Surrey

Age UK Surrey administered One Stop Surrey from April 2014 - September 2016. One Stop Surrey provides a checklist for older people, their families, carers or professionals to complete. The information supplied is then used to identify and refer people to appropriate organisations, the voluntary sector or local authority for support. 122 referrals were received from April - September 2016. From October 2016 Surrey County Council took the administration in-house.

Help at Home

We will provide practical support and services to help older people remain independent at home.



Help at Home

Across the County 2,343 clients enjoyed the benefits of our Help at Home Service this year.

Our friendly and reliable Home Helps undertake a wide range of tasks to improve the quality of life for anyone aged 50+ who

would like support with everyday tasks around the home and garden. Some of the domestic services on offer include: light housework, laundry, cooking, shopping and dog walking. Having a Home Help not only supports the client in a very practical way, but also provides friendly, regular company. Our affordable Service is tailored to each client's needs; they choose the support they require. One of our highly experienced and caring Help at Home Co-ordinators will talk with them about their requirements and personally introduce the clients to a Home Help.

The Service would not be possible without our team of 717 self-employed Home Helps, co-ordinated and managed by small teams in four offices across the County. All our Home Helps are security checked, to give our clients peace of mind.





Gardening

Our Gardening Service is a popular, low cost Service delivered across the County. The service provides basic gardening such as mowing the lawn, weeding and planting - so clients can enjoy and make the most of their garden. This year 198 gardeners have tidied the gardens of 745 clients.

Keeping You Connected

We will provide a wide range of activities and services to help older people remain healthy and active.

Making Connections

Making Connections supports older people to stay independent and helps keep them more socially or physically active.

The Service is tailored to each and every client's individual needs. Co-ordinators talk to clients to find out the goals they wish to achieve, for example having a regular home visit, going for a walk, taking up a new hobby or joining a community group. The Co-ordinator will personally introduce the client to a trained volunteer if appropriate, who will help them every step of the way.

We also offer support through Skype (internet required) or by telephone, if the client prefers.

Making Connections - Surrey Heath

In Surrey Heath the Service was funded by the Surrey Heath Borough Council and delivered in partnership with Surrey Heath Borough Council and Surrey Heath Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG).

Between April 2015 - June 2016 (when the contract ended) we supported 73 people.

Making Connections - Guildford & Waverley

Through the support of the Poyle Trust and Waverley Borough Council we are able to provide our Making Connections Service to residents of Guildford and Waverley. We supported 92 clients throughout the year and are very grateful to our funders for supporting this Service.

Making Connections, Farnham and North East Hampshire

Making Connections North East Hampshire started in July 2016 and combined with the successful Making Connections Farnham programme, which ran during 2015/16. The Service is funded by the North East Hampshire and Farnham CCG (Vanguard funding). Referrals come through GP surgeries. There were 275 referrals in 2016/17. The team were supported by 4 volunteers.

Virgin Care Hospital Activities Service

Age UK Surrey has worked with Virgin Care since November 2014 to provide activity sessions and working with people on a one to one basis in three community hospitals – Milford, Farnham and Woking. The Service has been very popular, with up to 63 patients participating each month. We wouldn't be able to run this Service without the support of our 9 volunteers.

Living Well, Guildford and Waverley

Age UK Surrey was delighted to be selected by Age UK to develop their Integrated Care Programme as part of a local partnership. The project was part funded by Age UK and part funded by Guildford and Waverley CCG. The programme ran from August 2015 until August 2016.

Four Personal Independence Co-ordinators received referrals made through health professionals then worked with the individuals to assist them to achieve their personal goals, with support from volunteers.

Of the 324 clients that the project helped overall, 94 were supported during the five months of 2016/17.

Keeping You Connected

We will provide a wide range of activities and services to help older people remain healthy and active.

Computer Drop-in Centre

The Computer Drop-in Centre, located in Dray Court, sheltered housing in Guildford, is run by a friendly and experienced team of Age UK Surrey volunteers who offer one-to-one tuition and advice. Anyone who wants to learn and improve their skills in using a computer, mobile phone or tablet, are welcome to drop in. The Centre has computers, or people are welcome to bring their own devices.

An average of 48 people per month have used the Centre during the past year.

Men in Sheds

The Men in Sheds project, located in Ash brings together older men to meet up in their own space, socialise and learn new skills from each other. It operates from a large converted garage, owned by Guildford Borough Council, next to the Shawfield Day Centre. The Shed is a very successful venture and opens two days per week with four sessions, each being managed by a qualified Co-ordinator and three volunteers. We are grateful to the Community Foundation for Surrey who fund this activity.

A total of 25 men attended the shed from 2016/17. They have many different reasons for attending, but the overall difference that the Shed makes to their lives is huge.

The Shedders work on their own projects and also carry out activities that will bring benefit to the local community. Men in Sheds have also used their carpentry skills to produce some beautifully crafted items for sale to help with funding.

Tea & Chat

Tea and Chat started in January 2014 and provides a place for older people who live in semi-rural and rural areas to come together and socialise with one another.

We are grateful to Tandridge District Council who funded the sessions this financial year.

A Co-ordinator organises a programme of activities and speakers for the sessions. Six volunteers have supported the 40 sessions, which take place in Caterham fortnightly and in Lingfield and Oxted on a monthly basis.

Up to 78 clients per month have enjoyed the sessions and 713 people throughout the year.

Café Culture

Café Culture is a weekly social group that meets every Wednesday at Mann's Coffee Shop in Cranleigh.

The activity was launched on 15th February and has received a very good response in the first few weeks of running, attracting both existing and new clients.

Waverley has pockets of isolation, particularly in rural areas. Café Culture is one initiative that we set up in Cranleigh to encourage people over the age of 50 to meet up weekly as a social group within the community. The activity provides the opportunity to meet new people and build friendships in a social environment.

Some people come on their own and others bring their carers or family members to join in with the conversations.

Healthy and Active

We will provide a wide range of activities and services to help older people remain healthy and active.



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Feet First

Our trained Footcare Support Workers provide a vital toenail cutting and filing service across 16 clinics, covering Woking, Guildford, Waverley, Elmbridge, Banstead and Dorking. Many of our clinics have multiple sessions per week. The Service is staffed by a Co-ordinator and Footcare Support Workers.

We delivered a total of 1,044 appointments and we had 168 new clients accessing the Service during the year.

Shopmobility

The Charity has managed the Shopmobility Service, located in the Bedford Road car park in Guildford on behalf of Guildford Borough Council since 2009.

Shopmobility has a variety of scooters to cater for all our 1,976 registered clients. In 2016/17 the number of trips amounted to a total of 2,289. The Service carries a modest charge.

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GO50 Walking and Cycling

GO50 provides regular exercise for older people through an ongoing programme of walks, cycle rides and Nordic walking, led by a team of 24 volunteers.

In 2016/17 approximately 1,145 people took part in a GO50 activity and were able to enjoy the benefits of exercising in open countryside whilst socialising and having fun at the same time. There were 362 walks, 32 cycle rides and 25 Nordic walks.

Donations from the walks and cycle rides help to fund these activities.

Our volunteer cycle leaders formed their own cycling group in June 2016.

Counselling

Our confidential Counselling Service is offered to older people and their carers. It gives them the time and space to explore their emotions and help make sense of them.


During the year our Counselling Co-ordinator and 21 professional counselling volunteers supported 99 people. A total of 628 counselling sessions took place.

Sessions are delivered in the client's home or an alternative confidential location can be found. A charge of £20 per session was introduced in August 2016 which goes towards the running and sustainability of the Service.

Fundraising and Supporters

The work of the Charity is funded through grants and trusts, statutory bodies, donations, legacies, community fundraising and events and through the income we raise from some of our Services.

As statutory funding reduces our reliance on voluntary income grows. Without the support we receive from donors we would not be able to deliver our Services.

This year we have received a very generous £285K in donations and legacies.

Thank you to all our donors and supporters who have raised monies to ensure we can continue to deliver our Services.

We are very grateful to our subsidiary trading company, Age UK Surrey (Trading) Ltd, who gifted £60,000 to the charity to support our work.

Both Trustees and staff continue to look for new ways of raising funds to meet the demand for Services provided to older people in the County.

Events

We have been very busy this year promoting our Services and events around the County. Events such as Farmers' Markets, Retirement Fairs and Community Conferences. They are all great opportunities to meet both new and existing supporters and clients.

Open Garden Event

With thanks to Lavinia Sealy, our President, we were able to celebrate Older People's Day with an Open Garden event at Timber Hill in October. Guests enjoyed the beautifully kept and stunning 15 acre garden with views to the North Downs.
