
Oh We Did Like To Be Beside The Seaside!!

We ran a number of sessions over the 6 weeks:

- We offered Information and Advice Drop-In Sessions for people to talk to us about benefit entitlements, blue badge applications and to gain advice on a whole range of topics.
- Our 131 Club Team provided singing and chair based exercise sessions to get people talking and find out more about the fun we have every day in our social club.

Monday the 1st of October was National Older People's Day and we celebrated this with a number of stalls at the Pop Up Shop. Be Well offered health checks, Healthy



Minds provided information and advice about local mental health services and people got to have a go at curling with expert help from Active Tameside. There were also opportunities to talk about volunteering with Age UK and The Scouts. Throughout the time at our Pop Up Shop,

we talked to around 140 people, which was great.

As part of the Loneliness Forum in Tameside - a group of local organisations working together to reduce loneliness in the borough - we held a Golden Harvest event on Friday 5th October. The morning event was held in Ashton and we spent the afternoon in Hyde offering chair-based exercise taster sessions and information about volunteering and the fantastic work we do. Working in conjunction with local organisations such as Action Together, Public Health, The Together Centre, Be Well, Jigsaw Homes, The Community Response Team and more, the event was a great success.

As part of the Golden Harvest event, Public Health launched their new 'Take A Seat' Campaign for Tameside as part of their strategy to create an age-friendly borough. Local businesses can sign up to the campaign and are provided with a seat so that older people know where there are dedicated places around town that they can take a seat, and maybe have a glass of water, whilst out and about. Businesses will display a sticker in their window if they are taking part and although this campaign is in its early stages, it has proved extremely successful in South Manchester so Tameside are hoping to replicate this success. Age UK Tameside will be taking part in the campaign too so watch this space and look out for a sticker in our window!

CHRISTMAS, THIS YEAR, IS WONDERFUL

June and David were a successful couple in the world of computers. They provided a service creating useful programmes for small businesses and trades people. And as success brought more success, thoughts of having a family were put 'on hold', year after year.

That's how Clare came to be adopted! She was only six months old, when she was brought home to the lovely 'Coley' mansion in Staffordshire. A few days later Sylvia was engaged as a nanny, caring for the child and tending to the family's comforts in other ways. Sylvia soon became a part — an indispensable part - of the family.

Clare is sixteen this year - almost an adult, you might say, and (as the law permits it today) her curiosity to find out who her real parents were, particularly her mother, was not necessarily encouraged, neither was it totally restrained. When it seemed positive that Clare did want to find out for certain, David and June whole-heartedly gave their support.

Initial enquiries from the Adoption Society could only reveal that Clare's mother came from the Lake District, from an area called Ings. Delving further into the history of the case, through other agencies, David and June were told that the name of the mother, who gave up her baby for adoption, was Mrs. Ida S. Somerset.

Pleased with the information they had, they visited the Lake District, with Clare, during the next few breaks in their schedules, in the sincere hope that they could find something to their advantage, while at the same time, wishing that they would not have to endure any pain that might follow as a result.

Little by little, they managed to piece together the sad story of Ida Somerset: her unhappy marriage to Ingram Somerset, who left her even before their child was born; her move to the Midlands, with her babe in arms. After that, there was no news of Ida. That was some sixteen years ago! She could be anywhere!

Every time that the Coley's returned from the Lakes with some positive information, Sylvia seemed to feel low in spirits; this last visit, however, had come to a dead-end, but, this time, Sylvia's demeanour was spirited and bubbly! Perhaps, it's Christmas and what with Yuletide and Good Cheer and all that! At least, David and June were pleased that Sylvia seemed so cheerful.

Although Sylvia remained in the kitchen while the Coley's entertained their friends to a Christmas feast, they insisted that she joined them for coffee and mints in the lounge afterwards.

Flash-bulbs popped and 'Polaroid' snaps soon started going round the room, when one of the guests remarked how very much alike Sylvia and Clare looked. There was a momentary silence, which was broken by another round of coffee, but by then Sylvia had left the room.

That night, June and David looked again at the snaps of the evening. Yes, there was this look-alikeness between Clare and Sylvia.

I like everything about coming here, but the first thing that stands out is simply being around other people. Getting the chance to chat, socialise and have fun with others is so important. I was feeling a little isolated and sometimes lonely before I started coming here. Now I don't.

Which of our activities do you enjoy the most?

I enjoy them all and it's nice to have a choice of what to do. I know that I can come here and if I choose to, I can do arts and crafts, have a sing-a-long or just sit and chat with my friends. I think personally I enjoy the armchair exercises the most because I feel that I really benefit from them. They definitely help me to keep more mobile and have less joint pain and stiffness.

Has anything surprised you about the 131 Club?

Yes quite a lot. I was expecting it to be more like a care home at first, and wouldn't have liked that. It isn't like that at all; it's a club/cafe/community centre where I get to do things I really enjoy with people I've enjoyed getting to know. The food is always really lovely and satisfying and I even met an old friend here that I had known at school and hadn't seen for many years. I see her often now and it is always lovely to have a catch up.

Would you recommend the 131 Club to others?

I would, in a heartbeat. I would suggest that people at least give it a try. Just come along and try a day, see what you think. That's exactly what I did four years ago and I've been coming ever since. You'll never know if you don't try.
