First, listen to Ms M Woodham's childhood memory of celebrating VE Day:

"I remember I was 10 years old and we were living in Pershore in Worcestershire. I went with my 8-year-old sister to a celebration which was held in a barn, organised by the local farmer at the end of our lane. The barn was done up with flags and we had to dress up - the lady next door dressed me as a nurse and my sister was a fairy. We danced in the lane and the food was lovely, including things I had never seen or eaten before such as jellies. There was sandwiches and fruit. I tried something I had never eaten before, and it tasted horrible. I tried describing it to my mother when I got home, but she didn't know what I was talking about. I found out afterwards that it was a banana - but I had tried eating it with the skin on!"

Then we'll have some Lord Woolton Pie

This pie was widely served in the Second World War when rationing and shortages made other dishes hard to prepare. This dish enabled a nutritious diet to be maintained. The dish was named after Frederick Marquis, who was the 1st Earl of Woolton. It was named after him because he popularised the recipe after he was appointed Minister of Food in April 1940.



Lord Woolton Pie is made of cauliflower, parsnips, carrots, potatoes, spring onions, marmite (yeast extract or a stock cube), rolled oats, salt and pepper, and parsley (fresh or dried). Then the pastry consisted of wholemeal or whole-wheat flour, mashed potato, margarine or lard, baking powder, salt, and, water. These were all rations during World War II.
