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TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

The Trustees have pleasure in presenting the Trustees' Report and audited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2019.

The Directors of the Charitable Company (the Charity) are its trustees for the purpose of charity law and throughout this report are collectively referred to as the Trustees.

The Group consists of the charity together with two wholly owned trading subsidiaries; Age Scotland Trading Ltd and Age Scotland Enterprises Ltd and Care & Repair, of whom Age Scotland became the sole member on 1 June 2018.

Our vision for older people in Scotland

A Scotland and a world where older people flourish as valued and equal citizens.

Our part in fulfilling that vision; our Mission

To help all older people present a strong and effective voice and to reduce the challenges for those facing serious and multiple disadvantage as they grow older.

Financial Review

The group's result for the year is a £817,119 surplus (2018: £1,397,723). The Charity continues to identify and implement efficiencies where possible. The reduction of legacy income received within the year, has contributed to the decreased surplus. The Charity has also been successful in attracting restricted funding throughout the year for its various projects as outlined in Note 20 to the financial statements.

The Charity's work is highly dependent upon the level of legacies and donations it receives from the public each year. In addition, Age Scotland Enterprises Ltd and Age Scotland Trading Ltd support the Charity by delivering differing levels of gift aid. The Charity is also reliant upon the Scotlish Government and other agencies for its restricted project funding. In 2018/19 this amounted to £811,202 (2018 £895,857).

Legacies

Age Scotland benefited from £1,100,439 (2018: £1.652,025) in legacy gifts.

Donations

The Charity received £234,501 (2018: £141,170) from donations during the year.

Trading

Age Scotland Enterprises Ltd

The operating profit for the year ended at £244K, which although 9% below plan, is still considered a strong performance. From December 2018 the Lottery income of £103K was remitted direct to the Charity due to changes in Gaming rules and a further grant of £53K was made to the Charity to reflect changes in the Home insurance terms. On a like for like basis, profit was £400K. Travel and motor were the strongest performing streams while Home fell by 34% and 19% against plan. Costs were controlled throughout the year and overall expenditure fell by £46K below plan.

Age Scotland Trading Ltd

During the year the programme continued to wind down our Retail operations, a decision taken in 2016/17.

For the year 2018/2019 the overall business incurred a net profit of £38K, which was £33k better than plan. Bathgate closed in August 2018 leaving one remaining shop, Broxburn which generated a net profit of £60K. This was offset by costs incurred relating to the disposal of the remaining closed shops.

Trustees' Review

The Trustees of Age Scotland continually review its Strategic Plan against the external environment in which we operate. A refresh of the plan was undertaken, leading to three Strategic Aims being agreed by the Board;

- We promote positive views of ageing and later life;
- We help older people to be as well as they can be;
- We tackle isolation and loneliness.

Key Performance Indicators 2018-2019

In agreeing a refreshed Strategic Plan the Trustees also agreed to receive quarterly reports on the progress made against the Strategic Outcomes and the underpinning Key Performance Indicators (KPIs).

A brief summary of our activities, against the strategic aims, is as follows:

Charity Services

We promote positive views of ageing

2018 was a special year of celebration for Age Scotland and our members. 75 years earlier Age Scotland's predecessor charity, the Scottish Old People's Welfare Committee was founded to raise awareness of the needs of older people. With support from the Heritage Lottery Fund, members and community development staff took part in an ambitious project to find out more about the charity's history, the development of local and national older people's groups in Scotland and the people involved in them, and to share this remarkable story in a special issue of Advantage magazine, and in film. The celebrations culminated in a reception at the Scottish Parliament on 2nd October 2018 with a keynote speech from the Minister for Older People, Christina McKelvie MSP and 150 invited guests from member groups and stakeholders.

The Scottish Parliament hosted a special debate in October celebrating the 75 years of Age Scotland and its preceding charities. This was an opportunity for a large number of Members of The Scottish Parliament to showcase the positive contribution older people groups and organisations make to their community as well as talk about the impact that Age Scotland makes in advocating on behalf of people over the age of 50.

Age Scotland's National Conference and Awards Ceremony took place in March 2019 in Glasgow. With the help of guest speakers and workshop leaders our conference examined the topics of "Homes, Health and Happiness" – topics that have been important throughout the charity's 75 year history and which continue to require great energy and attention by Age Scotland, our members and partners today.

The 2019 Age Scotland Awards, which formed part of the National Conference, recognised the exceptional commitment and contribution individuals and organisations make to ensuring Scotland is a good place to grow old in. There were eight presentations, including a new award to recognise the work of a young volunteer. This was Age Scotland's largest conference to date with 343 people attending including representatives from 117 Age Scotland member organisations.

The Policy and Communications team regularly challenge negative stereotypes about ageing in the media. This includes offering counterpoints and case studies to demonstrate the value, experience and positive contribution older people in Scotland make, whether it be to the economy, workplace, as unpaid carers, volunteers and much more. The team also proactively work with journalists to change the language surrounding dementia to promote phraseology such as "affected by" or "living with" dementia rather than "suffering".

Age Scotland has a well established relationship with the Scottish Government as the major national voice for older people. As stakeholders we have regular opportunities to discuss and influence Scottish Government policy on a wide range of issues that affect older people in Scotland.

The charity's political engagement has been extensive with four appearances at Scottish Parliament committees to give expert evidence on issues such as human rights, funeral expense assistance benefits, pension credit changes and elder abuse. Age Scotland provided more than 20 political briefings for parliamentary debates, responded to 17 policy consultations, were mentioned by politicians in 22 debates and were the subject of 12 Scottish Parliament motions.

Age Scotland is part of the First Minister's National Advisory Council for Women and Girls and has undertaken numerous consultation events with colleagues about issues affecting older women in Scotland.

We help older people to be as well as they can be

The Age Scotland Information and Advice service produces guides and factsheets and works with Age UK and other partners and projects to ensure that their information is relevant to older people in Scotland. Major changes have been made to the Benefits Maze as well as the Care Home and Care at Home funding guides. A new guide was created for older carers to highlight entitlement under the Carers (Scotland) Act. In partnership with Eat Well Age Well the Eat Well guide was updated and new scams guides were developed in partnership with the Early

Stage Dementia project. Last year 35,836 publications were requested and sent to people in Scotland. Power of Attorney continues to be our most popular guide.

The Age Scotland Helpline provides information, friendship and advice to older people and their families. Over the last year our helpline took 10,498 inbound calls and when outbound calls are included this number raises to more than 20,000 calls being handled by our advisers. The most common type of call handled was for benefit and entitlement checks which helped to identify far in excess of half a million pounds for older people which would otherwise have gone unclaimed. This was followed by enquires about community care and residential care. Quality assurance survey results show that 98.8% of callers would recommend Age Scotland to a friend.

Calls increased in the first quarter of 2019 compared to the same period in 2018 mainly due to the publicity around the changes to mixed age couples pension credit rules.

Our Veterans' Project team work in conjunction with the Helpline, Information and Advice, Community Development, and Policy and Communications teams to promote the rights of older veterans and advertise initiatives where they can get extra support, whether it is healthcare, transport assistance, benefit entitlements or respite. The team conducted a wide range of outreach activities to older veterans groups across Scotland and work in partnership with others from the Unforgotten Forces consortium to develop policy initiatives.

Our Allied Health Professionals extended the roll out of Body Boosting Bingo across Age Scotland's member groups. In its second year we have provided 75 Body Boosting Bingo workshops to a total of 1,954 people in locations around Scotland in 30 of the 32 local authority areas. The team have also provided 33 member groups and four partner organisations with tailored follow up and support to improve their confidence to deliver Body Boosting Bingo themselves.

Body Boosting Bingo underwent substantial and significant change since the original concept was piloted late in 2016. New formats were developed which included a digital version available as a download, on USB or on PC DVD, and booklets in A4 and A5 sizes. The booklets are accompanied by 30 sided dice to help randomise which exercise is selected. The full launch of the new product is due for April 2019 and will be available for free to members of Age Scotland.

The 2018/19 Islands Challenge ran from 1st October 2018 to 31st January 2019. A total of 14,608 miles were covered, which is the equivalent of 3.6 times around all of Scotland's coastal islands. More than 30 staff, volunteers, colleagues, friends and family took part in addition to 16 member groups who donated their steps from their Body Boosting Bingo sessions

The Community Development Team provided tailored support and relationship building visits to more than 80 groups across Scotland. There were 30 local network meetings organised, from the island of Skye to the Scottish Borders. Further individual meetings and support were undertaken with Men's Sheds across Scotland by the dedicated member of the team. The network meetings enable members to meet with each other, share news and experiences, access information, and engage with and influence policy issues.

Christmas can be an especially difficult and lonely time for some older people. In November 2018, 14 Age Scotland member organisations in Edinburgh and Glasgow were awarded small grants of up to £500 to assist with the costs of holding an event or festive celebration bringing older people together. The grants programme was made possible thanks to a donation to Age Scotland from the Scottish property company Ross & Liddell.

Members used their Age Scotland grants to provide Christmas lunches and entertainment, transport for outings, theatre tickets and the purchase of small gifts for older people who were unwell and unable to attend events.

The Early Stage Dementia Project continued to deliver dementia awareness workshops across Scotland from Orkney to Dumfries and Galloway. Between April 2018 and March 2019, 1,475 individuals were trained from a broad range of groups and organisations.

The project also worked in partnership with the Veteran's Project, jointly delivering 20 workshops across the country to people from around 100 diverse groups and organisations. This enabled the project to have a much broader reach.

A toolkit was also developed focussing on what makes a community age and dementia friendly. Over 160 copies have been distributed across the country with the aim being to encourage local communities to discuss their local communities and where appropriate take action to make improvements.

We were successful in winning the tender from the Life Changes Trust to facilitate a national dementia policy and practice forum. This work will last five years and partnerships with people living with dementia, their unpaid carers, charities and organisations will be developed to help improve the quality of life for those affected by it. The total tender is worth over £2 million as half of this work will be undertaken by the University of Edinburgh and Queen Margaret University who have set up a School of Leadership – called BOLD (Bringing Out Leaders in Dementia). The recruitment of three members of staff to lead the work of the policy and practice forum were recruited by Age Scotland in early 2019. This work will help cement our interest and offerings in the dementia world for the foreseeable future.

Age Scotland's Warm and Well project delivered 54 outreach sessions to older people's groups across Scotland to help increase awareness of the support available to improve household energy efficiency, bring down fuel bills and how to improve an older person's health by living in an adequately heated home. This work directly impacted the lives of around 1,000 older people.

Work continued in partnership with Transport Scotland to consult with older people about their transport needs. This work has helped form the basis of the Scottish Government's second National Transport Strategy draft and the charity's response to the future Transport (Scotland) Bill. In total there were 20 consultation events from Dumfries and Galloway to Orkney where more than 500 older people took part and shared their views.

Age Scotland's housing project published and distributed 10,000 copies of a new guide for older people called "Your Choice of Home in Later Life", which included a foreword from the Housing Minister. Extensive survey work was undertaken to identify the housing needs of older people in Orkney. This was funded by the Scottish Government and will help shape the support and housing development in the northern isles.

The Scottish Government launched the second phase of their housing strategy "Age, Home and Community" at the Age Scotland headquarters which was influenced by our work. Further research about the housing needs of older people has been developed with the University of Stirling and the report, "Housing Through the Lens of Ageing", will be published in 2019.

Our Age Inclusive Workplace workshops positively impacted over 2,600 older workers in Scotland, which brings the total number to nearly 4,500 from over 200 different Scottish organisations. Feedback from the workshops highlighted that 98% of attendees would recommend the workshops to a colleague.

The workshops raised £125,000 of revenue in the year and after third party expenses contributed nearly £100,000 towards our costs.

A new Age Inclusive Matrix programme was launched that works with Scottish employers to review the 15 different areas that could impact their ability to be an age inclusive employer. We then work with the employer steering group and staff representatives over a nine-month period to make meaningful changes to the workplace. The initial pilot group of four organisations was funded by the Workplace Equality Fund and made a significant

impact on those organisations as they look to thrive as their workforce ages. Further funding was secured for five
more years from the National Lottery Community Fund to continue this work.

- As part of the Planning for Your Future workshops, Age Scotland's Allied Health Professionals have delivered 32 health and wellbeing sessions with approximately 500 participants. During 2018/19 four Allied Health Professionals were trained to support delivery of these sessions and increase capacity particularly in the Aberdeen and Dundee areas.
- There has been significant interest in workshops focused on dementia and the home proving particularly popular. There were 38 workshops delivered to over 500 staff from three housing associations and Falkirk Council.
- Work continued in partnership with Transport Scotland to consult with older people about their transport needs. This work has helped form the basis of the Scottish Government's second National Transport Strategy draft and the charity's response to the future Transport (Scotland) Bill. In total there were 20 consultation events from Dumfries and Galloway to Orkney where more than 500 older people took part and shared their views.
- Age Scotland's housing project published and distributed 10,000 copies of a new guide for older people called "Your Choice of Home in Later Life", which included a foreword from the Housing Minister. Extensive survey work

We tackle isolation and loneliness

- Our Community Connecting service is a key part of our independent living strategy with the main aim of reducing isolation and loneliness by introducing older people in Scotland to organisations that offer social activities, friendship, health and fitness groups and events. Operating on a referral-based system through the Helpline, the Community Connecting team have received more than 150 referrals to enable older people to get involved with their community and pursuing their interests in the last 12 months. The Community Connecting service has also been extended to include working with the veterans and early stage dementia project groups to identify suitable activities and groups that are veteran and dementia friendly.
- The service is supported by a paid member of staff and six volunteers with a view to grow to eight volunteers over the next year. Callers are mainly in their 60s or 70s with the majority of clients based in Edinburgh, Glasgow and Fife.
- We began working with a creative firm, Frame PR, to develop a national campaign to raise awareness of loneliness and isolation in older people and promote ways which everyone can help reduce it. This campaign will launch later in 2019 and will help raise our public profile.
- Age Scotland were successful in helping to strengthen the Scottish Government's final national strategy to tackle loneliness and social isolation through a combination of effective lobbying, media relations and demonstrating good practice. Age Scotland have been given a seat on the Scottish Government's National Implementation Group which was set up as a result of one of our proposals. This group will scrutinise the government's work and help turn the national strategy into reality.
- Age Scotland organised a successful photo and media opportunity in the Scottish Parliament with the leaders of all the political parties represented there, including the First Minister, to raise the importance of beating loneliness and commit the politicians to take action.
- We helped to establish a new coalition of national charities and organisations with an interest in tackling loneliness and isolation. Along with valued partners such as the Campaign to End Loneliness, Red Cross, Royal Blind and Chest Heart and Stroke Scotland, the Action Group on Isolation and Loneliness (AGIL) has proved successful in shaping government policy.
- As part of the Independent Living proposition we launched a new Good Day Calls service in October 2018. This is a daily call to an older person to check in, make sure they are safe and well and provide friendship over the phone. This is a paid for service facilitated by our partners at Age Scotland Orkney and free places will be offered to older people on low income who are in receipt of Pension Credit.

Fundraising

The financial year ended positively in terms of fundraising. One area of primary focus has been on raising funds to support the growth of Independent Living services.

There has been continued work to build and develop corporate partnerships. Support for a small grants Christmas fund, the Twelve Days of Christmas, aimed at member groups in Edinburgh and Glasgow, was successfully sought from a corporate partner.

We are very grateful to all of our fundraisers who took part in a wide range of activities such as abseils, bungee swings, marathons and the annual "Big Knit" partnership with Age UK and Innocent.

Luminate

Supported by Age Scotland, Luminate is Scotland's creative ageing organisation. We value our relationship and it has been independent of our Charity since 2014. We have a service level agreement which defines our commitments to each other. Luminate is accommodated within the Age Scotland headquarters.

In 2018 Luminate embarked on a major change to their approach, moving from an organisation focused almost exclusively on running an annual festival, to an organisation that supports the development of creative ageing practice through a year-round development programme. The festival has become biennial to accommodate the growing year-round work.

Luminate aims to ensure that older people in Scotland are able to access high quality arts and creative activities whatever their background, circumstances and wherever they live.

Care and Repair Edinburgh

Care and Repair Edinburgh became part of the Age Scotland family in June 2018. They are a charity who undertake small repairs, handyperson and home from hospital services to older and disabled people in the City of Edinburgh area. They will form part of our Independent Living proposition service and will become housed within the Age Scotland headquarters from the summer 2019.

Governance

Over the year a review of our membership groups was undertaken to ensure GDPR compliance and by 31st March our membership had reduced to 700. We continually review Membership Development to ensure that the charity's resources are focussed on where they are needed most to deliver the strategic plan.

Our Regional Ambassadors continue to support the charity and work with member groups in a variety of ways including assisting with decision-making on the Age Scotland Tackling Loneliness and Isolation Policy, helping with planning for network events and our National conference, giving talks, visits and representing Age Scotland at important committees and conferences.

Age Scotland works with Age UK and the other members of the Age Network on areas of work aimed at delivering consistent and meaningful outcomes for older people in Scotland and the UK and ensuring that expertise and resources are directed towards greatest need.

The Memorandum and Articles of Association for the Charity were reviewed and updated in November 2018.

Related party transactions

Trustees are required to disclose all relevant interests and register them with the charity and in accordance with the Charity's policy withdraw from decisions where conflict of interest arises.

No Trustees received any remuneration during the year (2018- None). Details of Trustee expenses and related party transactions are disclosed in note 8 to the financial statements.

Reserves Policy

The Reserves Policy has been reviewed by Trustees during the year to 31 March 2019.

Reserves are held for three purposes:-

- (a) To enable the charity to meet all its obligations in the event of dissolution;
- (b) To hold sufficient liquid reserves to cushion the impact of fluctuations in legacy income from year to year;
- (c) To hold designated or restricted reserves for a particular purpose as identified by the board.

At 31 March 2019 £3,740,500 (2018: £2,810,754) was held in total unrestricted reserves, of this free reserves amount to £1,999,216 (2018: £1,415,302), the balance of free reserves as at 31 March 2019 represents just over 9.56 months of total unrestricted expenditure based on 2019/20 forecast unrestricted expenditure of £2.51m. It is the view of the Trustees that the group should retain the equivalent of at least 6 months (£1.25m) unrestricted operating costs as free reserves. The group has achieved the target of free reserves and going forward the plan is to maintain them at this level. Designated funds will be reviewed annually and expected to be used within for 5 years. The Group held reserves of £158,878 (2018: £271,505) which were restricted in purpose.

- We continue to maintain the strong relationship with Age UK and have agreed to roll forward the terms of the existing agreement until such time that new terms are agreed.

Volunteer Contribution

Age Scotland benefited from the contribution of over 47(2018: 91) volunteers across Scotland in 2018/19. Volunteers contributed to our Information & Advice team including the Helpline, Fundraising, Planning for your Retirement Workshops, and in our retail shops.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Accounting Policies

Basis of accounting

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) – (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Age Scotland is a private limited company, limited by guarantee, incorporated under the Companies Act in Scotland, with company number SC153343. The address of the registered office is Causewayside House, 160 Causewayside, Edinburgh, EH9 1PR. The nature of the group operations and its principal activities are set out on pages 1 to 11.

The company's functional and presentational currency is GBP. Rounding to the nearest pound has been applied to these financial statements.

Age Scotland constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS102.

In accordance with Section 1 of FRS102, exemption has been taken from disclosing a statement of cashflows for the charitable parent company.

The results of Age Scotland Trading, Age Scotland Enterprises and Care & Repair Edinburgh Ltd (from 1 June 2018) are consolidated on a line-by-line basis.

Going Concern

The Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the Group has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future, forecasts and projections are prepared and performance is monitored against these. Thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the annual financial statements.

Fixed assets and capital grants

Fixed assets are included in the balance sheet at cost. Depreciation is provided in the month in which the assets are brought into use. The rates of depreciation used are calculated to write off the cost less estimated value evenly over the useful life as follows:-

Property 2%
Leased property improvements 10%
Office equipment & IT Equipment 20%/30%
Fixtures, fittings & equipment 20%
Motor Vehicles 20%

Amounts under £500 are not capitalised.

Grants received in respect of fixed assets expenditure are recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are receivable.

Investments

Current asset investments are included at fair value as income at the date of gift. Investments are included in the balance sheet at market value at the balance sheet date.

Fixed asset investments are stated at cost less any provision for impairment

Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme and the pension charge in the statement of financial activities represents the amounts payable by the company to the fund in respect of the year.

The company previously operated a defined benefit pension scheme. Following a crystallisation event on 1 December 2005, the scheme has now been terminated.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Contd)

Accounting Policies (contd)

Operating Leases

Costs in respect of operating leases are charged on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Onerous leases

Where the unavoidable costs of a lease exceed the economic benefit expected to be received from it, a provision is made for the present value of the obligations under the lease. This is released over the remaining lease term.

Dilapidation provisions

Where the Group and Charity has a legal obligation, a dilapidations provision is created on inception of a lease. These provisions are a best estimate of the cost required to return leased properties to their original condition upon termination of the lease. Where the obligation arises from 'wear and tear', the provision is accrued as the 'wear and tear' occurs.

Expenditure

Direct costs are charged to the charitable activities and support costs are allocated on a relevant basis. Recharges of support costs are made to cost centres throughout the year on a percentage based on staff numbers, split as follows:

	Fundraising	Charitable Activities	Policy
Property, admin & management charges	6%	81%	13%

Governance costs are charged directly and include audit fees and committee expenses.

Fund accounting

Funds held by the charity are either:

- Unrestricted general funds these are funds, which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the Trustees.
- Designated funds these are funds set aside by the Trustees out of unrestricted general funds for specific future purposes or projects.
- Restricted funds these are funds that can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the Charity. Restrictions arise when specified by donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Investment income

Current asset income is recognised in the accounts when receivable by the charity. The gift aid received from the subsidiary companies; Age Scotland Trading Limited and Age Scotland Enterprises Limited, is recognised in the year in which it is earned.

Donations & Legacies

Donations and Legacies are accounted for when receivable. The recognition criteria are entitlement, probable and measurement. The recognition criteria adopted is 1. Entitlement; 2. Probable and 3. Reliably Measured.

Grants receivable

Grants receivable are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are receivable.

Gifts-in-Kind

Donated facilities and services are included in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are utilised at the value the charity estimates it would pay in the open market for an equivalent service or facility of equivalent utilities. An equivalent amount is included as expenditure under the appropriate heading in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Related party transactions

The group has taken advantage of the available exemption from disclosing details of transactions with other group entities, in accordance with FRS102, Section 33, on the basis that the transactions and balances have been eliminated on consolidation. Transactions with the wholly owned subsidiaries are disclosed at Note 2.

Transactions with directors are disclosed at Note 8.

Key management compensation is disclosed at Note 8.

Cash flow and Liquid resources

Cash flows comprise increases and decreases in cash and include cash in hand and cash at bank. Liquid resources comprise assets held as a readily disposable store of value. They include cash term deposits and bank notice accounts. Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and cash on deposit where funds can be accessed without penalty within three months.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Contd)

Accounting Policies (contd)

Financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are initially measured at transaction price (including transaction costs). The Group and Charity only has financial assets and liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. An analysis is given in note 23.

Holiday pay

A liability is recognised to the extent of any unused holiday pay entitlement which has accrued at the balance sheet date and carried forward to future periods. This is measured at the undiscounted salary cost of the future holiday entitlement so accrued at the balance sheet date.

Termination benefits

Age Scotland accepts that there are occasions when it may be necessary to make staff redundant and terminate their employment; our intention is to manage the business in a manner which results in secure employment for our employees and will always try to avoid the need for compulsory redundancies. Payments for redundancy are calculated on the basis of paying the statutory entitlements or above.

Goodwill

Goodwill represents the excess of the cost of a business combination over the fair value of the group's share of the net identifiable assets of the acquired subsidiary at the date of acquisition. Goodwill on acquisitions of subsidiaries is included in 'intangible assets'. Gains and losses on the disposal of an entity include the carrying amount of goodwill relating to the entity sold. Goodwill is carried at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses. Goodwill amortisation is calculated by applying the straight-line method to its estimated useful life. If a reliable estimate cannot be made, the useful life of goodwill is presumed to be 5 years.

Estimates of the useful economic life of goodwill are based on a variety of factors such as the expected use of the acquired business, the expected useful life of the cash generating units to which the goodwill is attributed, any legal, regulatory or contractual provisions that can limit useful life and assumptions that market participants would consider in respect of similar businesses.

Key judgements and areas of estimation uncertainty

In preparing these financial statements, the directors have made the following judgements:

- Determine whether leases entered into by the group either as a lessor or a lessee are operating or finance leases. These decisions depend on an assessment of whether the risks and rewards of ownership have been transferor from the lessor to the lessee on a lease by lease basis.
- Determine whether there are indicators of impairment of the group's tangible and intangible assets, including goodwill. Factors taken into consideration in reaching such a decision include the economic viability and expected future financial performance of the asset and where it is a component of a larger cash-generating unit, the viability and expected future performance of that unit.

Other key sources of estimation uncertainty:

- In determining whether an onerous lease provision is required, the discount factor used determines the present value of future payments is the group's weighted average cost of capital. This has been applied to the onerous element of the future payments to be made under the leases:
- Dilapidations provision has been determined using historical professional advice, adjusted for timings and taking account of subsequent negotiated reductions for similar properties.
- Legacies are accrued on prudent basis using historical data, of legacies received as compared to initial valuation received.

A defined contribution pension scheme is operated by the group on behalf of the employees. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the group in an independently administered fund. The pension charge represents contributions payable by the group to the fund and amounted to £100,358 (2018- £74,571).

The group previously operated a defined benefit pension scheme. Following a crystallisation event on 1 December 2005, the scheme has now been terminated. The Lothian Pension Fund and Age Scotland have a formal agreement in place to repay the liability. This liability is included within the Creditors, Note 13 of these financial statements.
